

Kelley Band Use Their Clubs and Down Providence Grays by 10 to 5

LEAFS HIT IN OLD-TIME STYLE NORTHERN BANGS OUT A HOMER

Two Providence Pitchers
Were Easy and Toronto
Wins by Five-Run Margin
—Fitz and Holly Chief
Swat-smiths.

All is forgiven. The noble band of Kelley came thru with enough hits yesterday to win two or three ordinary battles, and they were mostly at the needed time. The Grays got a real touncing to the tune of 10 to 5.

Twelve times did the lusty local clan swing their mighty clubs, and four times the clouts were for extra bases. Hub Northern supplied a homer; Eddie Fitzpatrick came thru with a triple, a double and a single; Holly's law was two one-runners and a middle-station knock, a nice little collection.

It was a free-hitting contest right from the start, with the Leafs chasing Lafitte to cover in one and a third innings, and Bunny Hearne only lasting three and a third sessions. Wheatley, who replaced Lafitte, was just as easy for the Kelley band, and Goulalt finished for Toronto. The latter had everything, and had the Grays eating out of his hand throughout.

The Grays hopped onto the Toronto southpaw hard in the second and shoved across two runs by timely hitting. Koecher's double drove in one, and Lafitte's scrapper to centre was responsible for the jump.

Jumped onto Hearne. Hearne got thru the third, but his fast one would not break in the fourth, and two more runs were the result, and it was good-night, Bunsy. Lafitte was away like a winner and disposed of the first three Leafs handily. It was not so in the second. Jordan drew a charity, and Hub Northern started the big Providence pitcher on the downward path by dropping one into the right-field bleachers—two runs. Graham followed it up with a single to deep short, and McConnell laid down a perfect sacrifice. Holly sent Graham to centre as single to centre. Exit Mr. Lafitte. Wheatley made Hearne and Fitz roll out.

A Real Lively Session. The third was a blank for the Leafs, but the fourth netted one. McConnell's single and Holly's double did the trick. Wheatley went higher than a toy balloon in the sixth, and some good, healthy values, mixed in with five bases on balls, gave the Leafs five runs. Graham rolled out to start, and then McConnell rapped into centre. Holly drew the first base. Goulalt forced McConnell at third, and then the fun started. Fitz doubled to left, and Holly was in. Wheatley refused to pitch when Umpa Hayes ordered him to, and O'Hara got three balls called on him without a ball being pitched. Then Wheatley tossed up a ball, and O'Hara walked, filling the bases. Brady's sacrifice was also walked, and another run was forced in. McConnell flew out to centre to end it.

Holly's single and Fitz's triple gave Toronto their last tally of the game in the seventh. Fitz was thrown out at the plate trying to stretch it into a homer.

TESTS COMPLETED

OF KINGSTON WATERS

KINGSTON, May 23.—(Special.)—F. A. Dallyn, provincial sanitary engineer, and his staff, who have been at work in this district for two months making tests of the waters under the joint management of the United States and Ontario, advised today that the recommendation of the international waterways commission, have completed their work and left for Niagara-on-the-Lake to do the tests there. The harbor and river as far as Ogdensburg were covered, and more than two thousand samples of water were secured and tested, and reports sent to headquarters.
