'GAMBOA BUSTED' AND CANAL

President Wilson Presesd a Button at the White House Which Exploded Dynamite That Broke the Last Great Barrier of Water Communication in the Panama Canal.

WASHINGTON. Oct. 10. - (Can. Press).—The momentary touch of a key by the president of the United States today sent a flash of electricity thru a continuous telegraph and cable connection of 4000 miles, setting off a gigantic blast of dynamite which exploded the Gamboa Dike, the last of the great physical barriers to water communication in the Panama

Canal. Great Britain's Diplomacy telegraphy, specially planned for the occasion. At precisely 2 o'clock this afternoon President Wilson, by simply closing a telegraph key at the White House, sent the current overland and under sea and just a few seconds later came a message informing him that the explosion had been successful.

The special circuit had been set up early in the day and the telegraph companies stationed men at every electric spark, has removed the last important point en route to guard

at the White House made four distinct dots at 20 seconds before 2 o'clock. This gave the signal for the engineers at the Gamboa Dike to be in readiness for the flash. They waited 20 seconds, and on the dot President Wilson closed the key which sent the current into the dynamite apparatus.

"There, it is all over," smiled the president. "Gamboa is busted."

The president sent Col. Goethals, engineer of the canal, a brief mes-
