## LARGEST DEAL LATELY

Assets of Over Million Change Hands-Sir Mackenzie Bowell Hon. Pres.


The Sun and Hastings Savings and Loan Company of Ontario is to be taken over by the Standard Reliance Mortgage Corporation. The transaction is the largest one in Toronto since the Bank of Nova Scotia a'bsorbed the Metropolitan Bank last July.

The former company has a paid-up capital of \$573,989. Holders of this are to be paid with shares of an equal amount in the absorbing company. An increase of one per cent. will be had in their dividends. Two of their directors are to be taken on the Standard Reliance board, and Sir Mackenzie Bowell is to become honorary president, a place not filled since the death of Lord Strathcona. Details have been ar anged and approved by the government. Shareholders are being advised. The total assets of the Standard Reliance will be brought up to \$6.296.210. The paid-up capital will be (\$2,559,093. The joint reserve will ag-gregate \$620.000. and the year's busi-ness should add greatly to this again.

Reduced Expenses. The letter to the shareholders of the Sun and Hestings, sent by the direct-ors, notes the fact that expenses will be reduced by the merger in propor-tion to the amount of business done,
