comfortable subsistence, no country in the world surpasses Upper Canada.

It is conceived, that for many years, the inhabitants of this province will be most profitably occupied in husbandry and coarse manu-But it does not appear to be factures. material that settlers should be chosen from the agriculteral counties only. Able bodied men of any class will quickly be qualified for the necessary occupations of a new country. Skill in certain works is advantageous in Canada; but mere manual labour is at first chiefly wanted; and if England does not afford good employment for the mechanic, he may go thither without regret. He will not find himself less qualified by his previous habits from gaining a comfortable livelihood upon his own land. They will sometimes prove valuable to him, when at intervals he labours for hire, or

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
