CHICAGO, May 21.—Confidence came back to buyers of wheat. Word passed around among brokers that selling pressure was off. A sufficient amount has been lodged with Mr. G. T. Clarkson, the assignee in charge, to liquidate the pressing indebtedness at once, and the remainder will be cleared up in the near future.

The chief item of news in connection with the financing of the Pearl Lake, however, lies in the fact that the syndicate have provided a fund to carry on development work at the property and to erect a stamp mill to treat the ores. Mining has been carried on to an extent where an ore body can be blocked out in a very short time, and the construction work of the stamp mill will therefore be started almost at once.

The syndicate who have bought into the Pearl Lake Co. and who have provided sufficient funds to carry on mining operations for years if necessary are capitalists who have been associated with mining, and particularly gold mining for a number of years. They have placed their own organization, the Hargraves Engineering Company of Philadelphia, in control of the management of the Pearl Lake, and all work will be carried on direct by their

pany of Philadelphia, in control of the management of the Pearl Lake, and all work will be carried on direct by their orders. Colonel R. W. Stevenson, who has years of experience in gold mining on this continent and who is one of the best known mining engineers who have ever gone into the Porcupine and Cobalt camps, will be in charge of the mine. Messrs. M. J. Ramsay and J. E. Wright of Philadelphia have been elected to the board of directors, and the control of the property and its development work will be in their hands.

Mr. Burr E. Cartwright, the present president of the company, will be re-

president of the company, will be re-tained on the board, but his interest will be a minority one only. In considera his controlling interest if a successful deal was to be made, Mr. Cartwright transferred enough stock to give the new interests control.
