Premier is Losing Ground in His Attempts to Carry Out Emperor's Promises; Dictatorship Looms Large Again—Strike Breaking.

LONDON, DEC. 6.—THE CORRESPONDENT OF THE TIMES AT ST. PETERSBURG HAS BEEN INFORMED ON EXCELLENT AUTHORITY THAT A REVOLT OF THE ST. PETERSBURG GARRISON IS CERTAIN TO OCCUR.

Shadow of a Dictator. London, Dec. 6.—The Telegraph's St. Petersburg correspondent writes: "The spectre of a military dictatorship, which has been looming on the horizon, is slowly gaining consistency and sharpness of outline."

Station Growing Worse. Berlin, Dec. 6.—The Tagesspiegel's St. Petersburg correspondent writes: "The situation is visibly growing worse. The critical moment is approaching."

Zemstvo Delegates' Warning. London, Dec. 6.—The delegation sent by the Zemstvo Congress to consult with Count Witte to-day presented a communication to the premier, in which they pointed out that they were not coming for themselves, but for the great mass of the country when they demanded universal suffrage.

A Bitter Attack. The so-called landowners' congress at Moscow, which was composed of representatives of a number of reactionary organizations like the Banner of the Holy Alliance and the Russian Patriots, seemed to have the cue to attack Premier Witte.

Official Note. An official note was issued to-day explaining that while the government was determined to carry out the reforms promised by the imperial manifesto of October 30, until the reforms are effected the old law must be enforced, except where they are already replaced by temporary provisions.
