Joint Traffic Arrangement Agreed Upon by

the Grand Trunk and Other Roads. The Grand Trunk has issued a circular of joint eastbound freight rates agreed to by the G. T. R., the Baltimore and Ohio, Central of New Jersey, more and Ohio, Central of New Jersey, Delaware, Lackawanna and Western, Erie, Lehigh Valley, New York Central and Hudson River, New York, Ontario and Western, Pennsylvania, Philadelphia and Reading, Rome, Waterfown and Ogdensburg, Western New York and Pennsylvania, and West Shore Railway. The new rates, which will raise the freight about 2c per 100 lbs., will go into effect Oct. 15.

The following are the commodities affected between Montreal and Western points to New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Albany and Troy: Rates on grain or grain products will include barley, bran, buckwheat, corn, corn flour or meal, feed, flour, malt, mill feed, oats, oat hulls, oatmeal, peas (whole or split), rolled oats, rye, rye flour, wheat, oilcake, oilcake meal. In carloads, minimum 30,000 lbs., unless marked capacity of car be less, in which case the marked capacity, but not less than 24,000 lbs., will be the minimum, except oat hulls, mill feed and rolled oats, which will make minimum weights, as per official classification.
