BUY ANOTHER LINE.
Cleveland papers announce that Messrs. Everett and Moore, who control the London Street Railway, have purchased the Cleveland, Painesville and Ashtabula traction line, paying for it the sum of \$120,000 in cash. This practically completes a trolley route from Cleveland to Buffalo.

Junk Dealers Turned Down;

Council Upheld Committee

Move to Have Unsightly Billboards Taken Down—

Reception Echo.

The city council last night finally disposed of the application of Moses and Samuel Leff, to be allowed to conduct a junk business on the corner of Maitland and Nelson streets, when a clause from No. 2 committee report, recommending that no action be taken, was adopted by a unanimous vote.

Mayor Judd was absent, and Ald. Gillen filled the chair in a most satisfactory manner. In fact, the alderman proved himself a very capable presiding officer, so much so that the members of the council were able to get through with their business by 9 o'clock.

When the junk matter came up, a number of persons opposed to the request of the Messrs. Leff were present, but they were not called upon. It had been expected that the junk men would ask the council to be allowed to deal in scrap iron only in the south end, but the people were prepared for this, and lodged a petition, which bore over 100 names, against the proposal. However, the junk men did not make the request, and the petition will remain on file to be brought forth if the scrap iron application ever comes forward.

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with the late Bishop Baldwin. Pavement Competition.

The board of works recommended that in compliance with the request of Dr. H. A. Kingsmill, a bitulithic pavement be laid on Park avenue, between Dundas street and Queen's avenue.

Ald. Matthews objected. He said there can be no competition on bitulithic.

Ald. Saunders said the majority of the property-owners on the street will have bitulithic or nothing, and if they are ready to pay any price for the pavement, the city should not object.

Ald. Matthews then pointed out that the local improvement act has now been amended, so that the council by a two-thirds vote may put down the class of pavement it deems best on any street where the people cannot agree.

The council thought this a good point, and the clause was sent back to No. 2.

Look for Damages.

Faulks & Campbell, acting for Francis Cochrane, of 1045 Francis street, notified the city that their client claims damages from the city because of injuries received through the alleged negligence of the city, in the non-repair of the sidewalks on the north pair of Laura street, the injuries having been sustained while the plaintiff was walking on the street on the 22nd of May, 1906. Referred to No. 2 committee.

Knowles & Co. notified the city to cease the nuisance caused by the dumping of the sewage from Maryboro Place into the river at the foot of Weston street. If the nuisance is not abated forthwith, Knowles & Co. threaten an action for damages. No. 2.

Local Improvements.

The following petitions for local improvements were referred to the board of works and assessment commissioner: For cement curb and gutter on west Maitland street, St. James to Grosvenor; for a cement curb and gutter on Dufferin avenue, between Prospect avenue and Cartwright street; for a tile sewer on Cathart street, between Dufferin and Tecumseh avenues; for a cement walk on Horne street west, Stanley to Becher; for a sewer on Grosvenor street, Waterloo to Colborne; for a sewer on Mary street, Egerton to Eva; for a sewer on Egerton street, Dundas to Mary; for permission to tap a sewer and also lay a sewer on Kent street, between Talbot and Ridout; for a cement walk in front of 120-124 Maitland street.

The Salvation Army asked to be allowed to conduct meetings in Victoria Park on Sunday afternoons as in former years, and the request was granted.

The Real Estate Association enclosed a copy of a resolution passed by the association on Friday night protesting against the city making a grant toward the Paving Club's dyke. Filed.

New Power Line.

Horley & Sweet, barristers, of Brantford, gave notice of an application to Parliament for a power charter for a company to develop power at or near Dundas, Ont., and to transmit it to points in Western Ontario, the name of the company being the Grand River and Western Power Company. No. 1.

Joseph Lynch appealed against being assessed on business tax as a drayman. No. 1.

The Y. M. C. A. asked for an arc light in the tent at the military camp, the tent to be used for religious purposes. Granted.
