CITY WILL NOT HELP IN FUTURE

Council Agrees Not to Help De-
fray Cost of Opening Up
Streets.

The city of London has grown tired of being asked by interested parties to pay the cost of the purchase of certain lands required to open streets which years ago should have been opened up all the way through them. Consequently, the council on Monday agreed to a proposition brought in by No. 2 committee that a bylaw be passed whereby it will be impossible for the council to contribute any sum of money toward the cost of purchasing lands from private parties necessary for street opening.

A case in point and which resulted in the bylaw being asked for, is that of the McKenzie estate in South London. Mr. R. K. Cowan, for the owners, desires to open up street 50 feet wide, running north and south and parallel with the line of the Southwestern Traction Company.

But the street, owing to the fact that the parties interested cannot come to terms, will only run a part of the way between Grand avenue and Emery street, instead of having an outlet on both streets. The McKenzie estate is making no trouble, and is very anxious to have the street opened, but the property at both ends of the proposed thoroughfare belongs to other parties, and they cannot get together. Consequently the only way to reach the street will be by cross-streets, to be opened from Ridout street east, and later on the people of South London will be asking the council to assist them in having the street opened up at both ends. To block any grant for the purpose, a bylaw such as is recommended by No. 2 is to be drawn up by the city solicitor and adopted by the council.

MOTHER EDDY'S TROUBLES

Her Affairs May Be Managed by
Court-Appointed Receiver.

Concord, N. H., April 3.—Counsel for the plaintiffs in the Eddy case said in a statement today that it appeared to them that Mr. Streeter, personal counsel for Mrs. Eddy, and those who have charge of her, have, after mature deliberation, arrived at the same conclusion as to the incapacity of Mrs. Eddy to manage her business affairs that her son came to when he saw her in January last.

This suit, they declared, is not directed against Mrs. Eddy or at Christian Science. The position of the petition from the beginning has been that, because of her incapacity to manage her business affairs, reformation as to the management, control and accounting thereof was necessary for her protection.

Now that the imperative need of this reform is conceded, counsel said, the remaining question would seem to be whether the interests of Mrs. Eddy will be best cared for and protected by a receiver appointed by the court or by trustees appointed by and acting practically as a continuation of the old regime.
