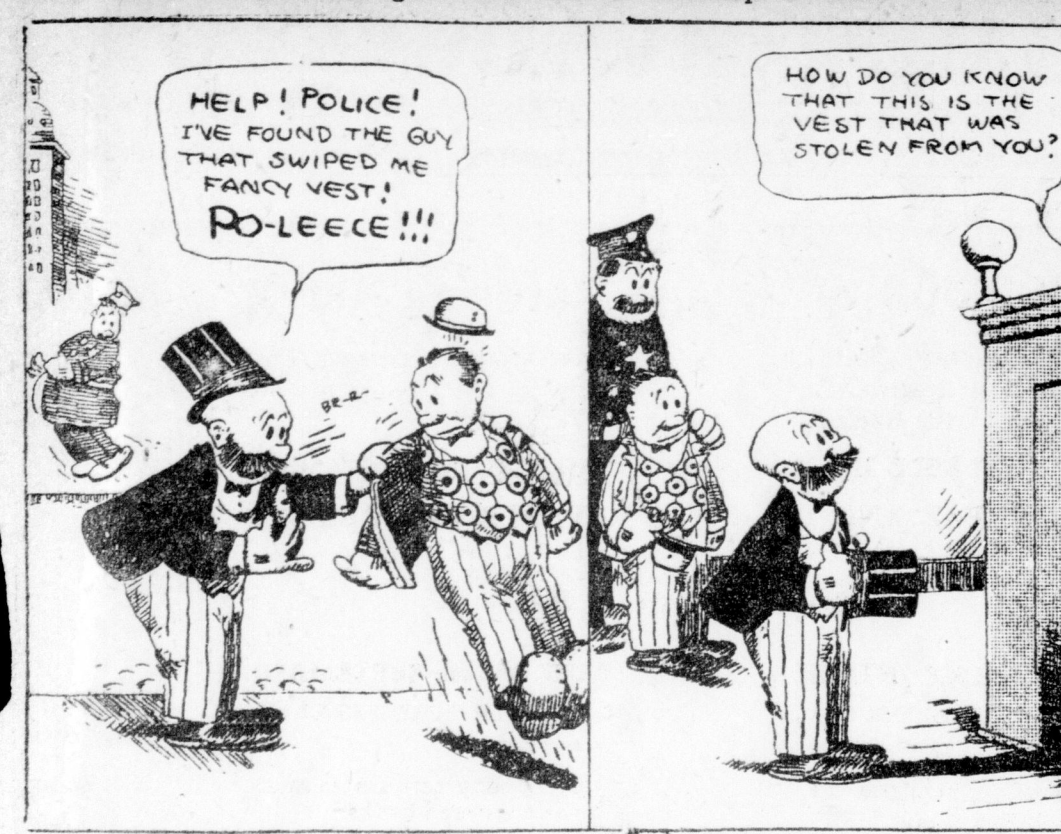


MUTT AND JEFF.—Jeff Ought To Be Fined For Contempt of Court.
