## PREMIER DRURY AND MINISTERS ARE SWORN INTO OFFICE TODAY

### YUDENITCH PREPARES FOR NEW ATTACK ON PETROGRAD

#### PREMIER E. C. DRURY AND MEMBERS OF HIS CABINET TAKE REINS OF OFFICE

Government of Ontario Now in Charge of Farmer-Coalition Cabinet and Members—New Ministers Are Sworn Into Office by Lieutenant-Governor Hendrie This Forenoon—Nelson Parliament, M. P. P., of Prince Edward, Likely To Be Selected As Speaker of the Legislature.

Toronto, Nov. 14.—According to schedule the Government of the province of Ontario passed into the hands of the farmer-coalition cabinet, headed by Hon. Ernest Charles Drury, shortly before noon today, when the new premier and his colleagues were sworn in at Government House by the lieutenant-governor, Sir John Hendrie. They then proceeded to the legislative buildings, where they were introduced to the staffs of their respective departments to whom in every case each new head was practically a stranger.

But one member of the new cabinet, Hon. Beniah Bowman, M. P. P. for Manitoulin, and minister of lands, forests and mines, was a member of the last Legislature, and none of the others have ever held seats in the Ontario House. Seats in the present Legislature have yet to be found for the premier, and for Hon. W. E. Raney, attorney-general, and Hon. Manning W. Doherty, minister of agriculture, but it is understood that various offers of retirements from elected candidates have been received to cover these.

This afternoon the Drury Government council held its first official meeting. Many matters were awaiting immediate attention. The question of the election of a Speaker for the new House has still to be decided. It is stated in some quarters that Nelson Parliament, Liberal M. P. P. for Prince Edward, who also had U. F. O. backing, will probably be the man for this position.

#### U.S. LABOR SECRETARY LOOKS FOR SATISFACTORY ADJUSTMENT OF DEMANDS OF COAL MINERS

Conference Between Men and Operators Is Being Held At Washington Today—Fuel Administrator Garfield Is Expected To Act in an Advisory Capacity—Operators Are Willing To Arrange Settlement.

Washington, Nov. 14.—At the conference of coal miners and operators from the bituminous coal fields beginning at 2:30 p.m. today, Secretary of Labor Wilson, acting as mediator, hoped a lasting settlement would be reached of the difference which led to the recent soft coal strike. Fuel Administrator Garfield has accepted an invitation from Secretary Wilson to attend and likely will act in an advisory capacity, although exactly what part he will play in the proceedings has not been announced.

The question of the time expiration of the Washington wage agreement of 1918 still was a subject of dispute, and it was believed the views of Mr. Garfield on this point would be sought.

The demands of the miners for 60 per cent increase in pay and shorter working hours were the other issue, and both the miners and operators have indicated their willingness to accept a reasonable adjustment of their differences and bring about harmony within their ranks.

#### Miners Remain Out Pending Outcome of Coal Conference

Chicago, Nov. 14.—Only slight increase in the amount of bituminous coal produced throughout the country was in prospect today. The miners generally showed a disposition to wait developments of the meeting today at Washington. The situation brought about by the lack of a desire on the part of workers to resume production in response to the strike recall message sent out by John L. Lewis, acting president of the United Mine Workers of America, under direction of a federal court mandator Miners in the Springfield, Illinois sub-district, speaking, what they said was the position of the entire Illinois membership, said that there would not be any coal mined until after the miners' operators' conference reached an agreement. In West Virginia, reluctance of the miners to return to work, especially in the northern districts, was attributed to machinations, largely of the L. V. W., and other radical agitators.

#### MAN CHARGED WITH WIFE MURDER TRIES TO COMMIT SUICIDE

Sub-Inspector of the Dominion Police Attempts Rash Act While in Jail.

Regina, Nov. 14.—John Wilson, formerly a sub-inspector in the Dominion police enforcing the military act, is in the general hospital here with 190 stitches in his throat as a result of an attempt to commit suicide with a small knife while in a police cell, awaiting trial for wife murder. Mary Wilson, who married in Scotland, in 1908, is missing, and has not been seen since September 27, 1918, when, according to the police, she was murdered in an automobile, near Borden Ferry, on the trail to Blaine Lake. Shortly afterwards Wilson married Jessie Patterson, with whom he had been in love for two years.

#### Canadian Soldiers Bring Back 25,000 Wives and Children

#### VICTORY LOAN NOW NEARING HALF BILLION

Ontario Has Subscribed More Than Half of Total To Date.

MANY OBJECTIVES PASSED  
Campaign Is Expected To End in a Whirlwind Finish.

Toronto, Nov. 14.—A total of \$452,256,478 has been subscribed to the Victory Loan, according to reports received up to noon today. This total, however, is inclusive of returns up to only Wednesday night from British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Montreal, up to Thursday night from Ontario Province and Quebec, and up to noon today from Toronto.

Toronto up to noon today had subscribed \$101,803,300, this morning's work netting \$219,000.

#### ITALIAN GOVERNMENT LIFTS FIUME BLOCKADE

Copenhagen, Nov. 14.—The Italian Government has officially raised the blockade of Fiume, according to advices from that city received through Ljubljana, Trieste.

#### ANTI-BOLSHEVIK ARMIES UNDER YUDENITCH, AIDED BY FINNS, TO OPEN NEW ATTACK ON PETROGRAD

Russian General Opposing Reds Is Confident That He Can Capture Capital Before Winter Sets In—Finnish Government To Supply People of City With Fuel and Food in the Event of Petrograd's Fall.

Washington, Nov. 14.—Preparations for another attack on Petrograd with consolidated forces, despite the early winter in Western Russia are being made by Gen. Yudenitch of the anti-Bolshevik army, Swedish press reports received here today stated. Gen. Yudenitch was said to be confident of his ability to take the city, although his forces have been drawn upon for duty elsewhere.

Conditions in Petrograd were reported to be worse than ever. In the event of the capture of the city by Gen. Yudenitch's army, the Finnish Government has agreed to supply the population with fuel and provisions.

A Stockholm newspaper has published a report of a confession by two Finnish Reds that the Soviet Government has been warmly supporting a plan of a fresh revolt in Finland, in which all bourgeois down to the age of eight years were to be killed. According to other published reports, Trotsky has written a letter saying that the danger threatening Petrograd has been averted, but not removed, and that Lenin, speaking in Moscow, has declared that he puts every hope in the workers of Western Europe.

#### RED ARMY IN BREST-LITOVSK DEFEATED AFTER HARD FIGHTING

London, Nov. 14.—The Bolsheviks have been overthrown in Brest-Litovsk, a Soviet wireless dispatch from Moscow today advised. After fighting the insurgents there for eight days the Bolsheviks withdrew "underground." (This expression is commonly used in Russia to indicate the temporary abandonment of an attempt to control the defeated elements, retreating and abandoning open, organized effort for the time being.)

The communists assert that the Bolshevik army in Siberia had captured 20,000 tons of grain. Another announcement in the message was to the effect that 20,000 tons of oil were burned in a fire at Grozny, in the Northern Caucasus.

Advices Girls to Stop Use of Paint and Powder Unless They Want Tough and Wrinkled Skins

Extravagance in Dress Is Also Condemned by Members of Y. W. C. A. Now in Convention At Hamilton—Extension of Work Is Advocated by the Speakers.

Hamilton, Nov. 14.—Addresses, discussion and papers made up this morning's program of the Y. W. C. A. National convention, the feature being the association as a social factor in boarding houses, cafeteria and lunch-rooms, extension work and health education, and suppression of vice. In short, a more extensive and aggressive policy was demanded.

Places of commercialized entertainment were well known to all girls. They were not ignorant about movies. Commercialized vice and aggressive

hand knew how to reach out in the city where they knew girls were to be found. Miss E. E. Jones of Toronto, leading the discussion, deprecated the use of paint and powder so prevalent today.
