With but one dissenting vote the general committee of the United Mine Workers of America in session here this afternoon voted to accept President Wilson's proposal for immediate return to work pending final settlement of the wage controversy by a commission to be appointed by him. Telegrams were sent out tonight to the four thousand locals of the union by officials of the mine workers, instructing the men to return to work immediately. 
