Chicago, April 25.—The railroads announced tonight that more strikers had returned to work today, and that the movement of live stock and meat was normal. They declared in a statement that since the strike began 1,052 workers have returned to duty, while 340 employees had been brought to Chicago from other points.

John Grunau, head of the outlay Chicago Yardmen's Association, following his arraignment yesterday with 41 other strike leaders before U. S. Commissioner Mason, said no mormeetings would be called, and no fur ther attempts made to end the strike whe strikers he said "would sit tight." Chicago, April 26.—Police today investigated an extensive card index system found in Harry J. James' automobile repair shop after he had been killed in a fight with policemen.
