

NO. 3 COMMITTEE IN FAVOR OF TWO STORY STRUCTURE

Recommends New Collegiate
Have Elevated Basement—
Trustee Coleridge Objects.

NEW TEACHERS HIRED

Men Tearing Down Old School
Have Pay Increased, As
Labor Requests.

It was decided that the new collegiate institute should be a two-story building with an elevated basement at a meeting of No. 3 committee of the board of education Monday afternoon. The motion was made by Trustee Edwin Smith.

Chairman T. Rowe stated that those appointed to view the latest designed high schools in five American cities did not give full details of their inspection in their report to the board. It was explained by Architect L. E. Carruth that a full report would be given, but it would contain a number of technicalities which probably would be of no use to the board.

Secretary R. M. McElzern was notified the county council that it wished to consult them regarding the plans which might have been made in connection with the new school.

Although Trustee Smith's motion in regard to a two-story school was approved by the majority of the committee, Trustee T. Coleridge said, "I am not at all in favor of the plans."

"Mr. Coleridge is in the objective case," Chairman Rowe replied. "In charge of the raising of the old building, said that the new building could be completed by the end of October. The contractors could begin work on the erecting of the new building. It was claimed that the new building could be opened nine months later."

Pay Increased. Harry Wray and Raymond Smith waited upon the committee in regard to the wages which were being paid to the laborers at work on the old building. It was claimed that some of the men, when the work was first started, their wages were raised to 55 cents.

The deputation explained that the wage was now paid laborers at the rate of 60 cents an hour. The board, however, decided to pay the men the increased wages requested by the deputation.

W. H. T. Mooney, principal of the collegiate institute, reported that he had secured three female teachers for high school work. The position was only temporary. He desired that no male teacher with sufficient qualifications could be secured for a short period.

It was decided to expend sufficient money to equip the cadets for their annual inspection, which was held September 1. A great deal of the cadets' equipment was destroyed. About \$30 will be the outlay for the new equipment.

DOES NOT WANT LONDON TO BECOME A SECOND WINDSOR

Too Many Out-of-Town
Drunks Coming Here,
Says Magistrate.

Two drunks graced the prisoners' box in police court today and both admitted the fact. One member of the duo who has appeared on a similar charge five times during the past few weeks, was arrested Monday night and bailed to appear for trial today. Magistrate H. M. Graydon expressed the opinion that after he was bailed he once more indulged.

"You are drunk now," said the court, "and if you take your auto out you are liable to be arrested and sent to jail for one month for driving a car while intoxicated."

The prisoner was allowed his freedom on bail until Thursday, on condition that he leave his auto at the police station, which he promised to do.

The second member of the inebriate group sported an arched eyebrow with blood and informed the magistrate that he hailed from Toronto. Last night his car collided with a brick wall.

POLICE OFFICERS CHASING SELVES DOWN IN WINDSOR

Now Arresting One Another in
Bold, Bad Border Town.

CITY COPS WIN TUSSELE

Jail Provincial Rum Hounds
Who Thought Somebody
Was Drunk.

WINDSOR, Aug. 16.—Provincial Police Officers H. H. Coward and William Cox of Toronto were arrested here early Monday morning by Windsor policemen on charges of being drunk, after they had attempted to arrest Patrolmen McPhee and Paddy, on that charge. They pleaded not guilty to the charge this morning, and will be placed on trial Tuesday.

Sent to Windsor by Attorney-General W. E. Roney to clean up the liquor traffic, bootleggers and drunkards generally, the two special officers started Sunday night on their work, and took along a little liquor as inspiration. So thorough were they in their search that Windsor officials commenced to fear they would crowd city cells beyond their capacity with prisoners. They reached the extreme, however, when they arrested Fairbank and McPhee, just as that officer was leaving work, and a few minutes later attempted to take Sgt. Brumton in charge. He was summoned and the two were locked up for the night. Two nearly-empty whiskey bottles were found in the automobile they were using as a police "black maria."

IF RUSSIA ADHERES TO TERMS BRITAIN WILL NOT OBJECT

Bonar Law Announces That
Armistice Terms Are
Approved.

LONDON, Aug. 16.—The House of Commons tonight, without division, agreed to the motion of Andrew Bonar Law, the Government leader, adjoint, that the British Government will not object to the terms of the armistice proposed by the speaker to summon Parliament earlier should public interest demand it. This, and Mr. Bonar Law's undertaking that in event of Russia's adhering to the armistice terms, the Government would take no action without consulting Parliament, moved the opposition's objection that the country should not be committed to any intervention against Russia without the consent of Parliament.

Mr. Bonar Law confirmed that the armistice terms to Poland as announced by Great Britain and Italy, and said that Great Britain would not interfere between Poland and Russia.

Although today's sitting had been especially called on account of the Polish crisis, it had, from his viewpoint, little interest, owing to the lack of news from Minsk, where Polish and Russian armies are conferring with the question of an armistice and peace.

Paragraphs in the newspapers recently, considered by some to have been inspired, has led the public to expect some new declaration of policy toward Ireland by the premier or Mr. Bonar Law on the lines of dominion home rule with complete independence.

Mr. Lloyd George, confining himself to repeating his promise to offer that the Government would discuss a settlement with any representative of Irish opinion, not excluding the Sinn Féin, provided they accepted three stipulations, which he carefully detailed. He said that the Sinn Féin must be treated separately; that there must be no secession directly or indirectly of any part of Ireland from the United Kingdom, and that the Government could not agree to anything that would involve any detriment to the security of the British Isles or of their safety in case of war.

This guarded statement, though announcing a new policy, will probably be interpreted as an invitation to continue outside discussions of dominion settlement, which have made such unexpected progress recently and enlisted support in hitherto hostile quarters.

Attack on Clynes. The premier's remarks concerning Ireland were mainly devoted to an attack on John R. Clynes, former food controller, for associating himself with the "direct action" policy of the labor party.

The premier argued that the recent discussions between France and Great Britain had strengthened his conviction that the League of Nations could not have been usefully convoked in the case of Poland, because the league could not act without unanimity, and that the Russians had refused to accept intervention by the league. He declared the British government's policy had been clear and consistent throughout. He had always protested against any invasion by the Poles of territories beyond the Polish border, and he believed Poland now regretted not having followed British advice, which would have averted great disaster. He promised soon to publish some of the dispatches exchanged on the subject. Publication now would be inadvisable, while the negotiations were pending.

Mr. Lloyd George said Poland had been clearly acquiescing in the invasion, within which the British Government was prepared to give the Poles support.
