### THOROLD TAKES M'NEAL JAIL: PRISONER'S PLEADINGS

David McNeal, and Police Driven From Burning Jail, Surrender To Crowd-Rope Prepared, But McNeal's Cry For Chance To Speak Is Heard—Crowd Listens and Hearts Soften.

Hearts Soften.

St. Catharines, Aug. 16.—Canadian commonsense and spirit of British fairplay tonight saved the life of David McNeal, who had been committed for trial during the afternoon at the town hall at Thorold on a charge of having murdered 4-year-old Margaret Boucock on July 13 last. The mob which clamored for possession of the prisoner numbered several thousand persons. The town hall was set afire after the prisoner and police officers had been smoked out. About 10 o'clock, when darkness had set in, the mob, which had grown to immense proportions, determined to get McNeal. and began to storm the town hall with bricks and stones. Before long every window in the newly-built building had been snattered, and then the mob attacked the doors.

McNeal and the police officers saved their lives by crouching in the corners and holding chairs in front of them, as yoleys of rocks swept through the building. At first several shots were fired out of the upper windows to frighten the crowd, but it did not hinder of men rushed a bundle of hay saturated with gasoline into the ground floor. 
