NO SEED GRAIN FOR ONTARIO

More Asked For, Says Premier—The Architect's Bill.

OTTAWA, March 23.—(Special.)—Before the orders of the day were called Mr. Boyce (Algoma) asked the minister if provisions of the seed grain distribution act would be extended to Ontario. Mr. Wilson replied that no regulations had been received from the provincial government.

R. L. Borden was informed that the report of civil service commission had been received by the government, but it would be some time before the commission had been asked to supply the data. On bill to incorporate the Institute of Architects of Canada being called in committee of the whole, Mr. Blain (Peel) asked if it was not an infringement of provincial rights. He thought it should be left for the provinces. Mr. Gervais agreed to withdraw the clause excluding building contractors from manufacturers and as father of the measure (Mr. Malash) was not present the prime minister moved that further consideration be postponed.

RATE LAW UNCONSTITUTIONAL

WASHINGTON, March 23.—The supreme court of the United States today held the Minnesota railroad rate law to be unconstitutional because of the enormous penalties imposed by it.

Injunction Permanent.
WASHINGTON, March 23.—The American Federation of Labor and President Gompers and others of that organization were permanently enjoined from "conspiring, agreeing or combining to restrain, obstruct or destroy" the business of the Buck Stove and Range Company. In a decision by Chief Justice C. E. Hughes of the supreme court of the District of Columbia today, making the temporary injunction of Justice Gould against the Federation in that case permanent.

Wingham Bylaw Defeated.
WINGHAM, March 23.—A bylaw to place the electric lighting plant under the management of three commissioners was defeated by a majority of 55.

CITY REFUSES OFFER FROM STREET RAILWAY

HAMILTON, March 23.—The special conference committee had a session this afternoon and turned down the offer made by the Street Railway Company. The Saturday afternoon train near Stony Creek the train broke in two, and he fell from the top of a car. Fortunately he fell clear of the track. He was picked up and brought to the City Hospital, where it was feared he had been seriously injured, but this afternoon he was able to leave for his home.

Explain Pope's Encyclical.
The encyclical of the Pope with reference to mixed marriages and other matters has been read in all the Roman Catholic churches of the city, and the priests will deliver sermons in explanation during Lent. One of the most interesting features with reference to mixed marriages, which after Lent, must be in writing, according to the new regulations. In case of private engagements there will be no marriage obligation.

The late C. W. Meakins left an estate valued at \$120,000. After the death of the widow it will be divided equally among the children.

Some 2000 unemployed emigrants appointed a deputation to ask the Mayor Stewart to-day at noon to ask for work. The mayor said the civic committee would be starting work, and that by April 1 there would be plenty of employment for every one. He promised that the council would ask the government not to send any more immigrants. Robert Roadhouse, the Socialist, addressed the crowd, but was repudiated by the committee.

Some of the pupils of John Hackett, who were planning to put on a turn at Bennett's theatre this week, have been forbidden to do so by the church authorities on the ground that it is contrary to the rules of the church, and not to be sanctioned during Lent.

Found Dead in Bed.
James Thomas, 50 Shaw-street, was found dead in bed this morning. William Fisher, arrested on a charge of vagrancy, may be charged with holding up a Stony Creek baker.

Rev. Samuel Laidman has been called to the Methodist church, St. David's. Walter Tallman has been appointed bursar of the Orillia asylum.

The Maple Leaf Amusement Company, which will establish a summer park at St. James' track, has been incorporated, with the following directors: W. H. Beyer, Buffalo; Samuel Robertson, Niagara Falls; John G. Gould, James Dickson and C. V. Langs. The park will be opened on May 25. The Conservatives will hold a meeting next Friday evening when addresses will be delivered by Findlay McDiarmid, M.L.A., Elgin, and Howard Ferguson, M.L.A., Leeds.

It is said that there is a chance of Hamilton securing Montreal's franchise in the Eastern League.

Bylaw Carried.
CAMPBELLFORD, March 23.—The rolling mills bonus bylaw voted on here to-day was carried by a large majority, only eight voting against it.

RAN INTO OPEN SWITCH.

Accident, on the C.P.R. at Burritt's Crossing.

SMITH'S FALLS. March 23.—(Special.)—An accident occurred on the C.P.R. at Burritt's Crossing a few miles east of Merrickville at 4:45 this morning.

A freight train going west ran into an open switch and ten cars were detached. All were empties except one. Engineer Birckett and Conductor Hutchings of Smith's Falls were in charge.

The morning express followed down, but the line was blocked here and went around by Ottawa. The auxiliary and steel crane were taken down from here and the line was cleared about noon. No one was injured.

PROTEST TO JOHN MORLEY.

Five Hundred Hindus Support Strong Resolution.

VANCOUVER, B.C., March 23.—Five hundred Hindus met yesterday in the Sikh Temple, and, after many exciting speeches protesting against their exclusion and deportation from Canada, and emphasizing the fact that this would be a strong weapon in the hands of those preaching sedition in India, sent the following cable to John Morley, secretary for India:

"We protest against deportation and exclusion from Canada. As British subjects we claim protection through the empire. If our interests are overruled by those in India, we must necessarily resent your government's neglect."

The cablegram is signed by Day Ram, who is a nephew of Asa Chandra, a Hindu of high caste, who came to British Columbia to spy out the land, but who is now agitating in India.

Campbellford Booming.

CAMPBELLFORD, March 23.—The ratemakers of Campbellford voted on a bylaw to-day to give the Canadian Steel Company a site of five acres and period of ten years, to supply them with power at \$10 per horsepower. The vote was almost unanimous, being 280 to 10.

Besides this development by the corporation, there will be several thousand horsepower developed by private companies. Already there are many large industries in Campbellford employing hundreds of men, women and children.

Drowned in a Cistern.

BRAMPTON, March 23.—(Special.)—While his parents were in Brampton on Saturday afternoon the seven-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Cram of Britannia, Peel County, fell into a cistern by stepping on a broken board and was drowned before he was discovered. Mr. and Mrs. Cram reside on the well-known Wagon farm, and the sad fatality has cast a gloom over the entire neighborhood.

New Baptist Church.

Rev. Dr. W. E. Norton dedicated the new Baptist church in Southampton, Ont., Sunday last. The congregation was organized three and one-half years ago, and has grown in membership from fifteen to fifty. The new building was purchased from the local Methodist church, and \$500 was expended in its complete renovation.

Dr. Norton was assisted by Rev. Mr. Terryberry, pastor of the local Methodist church, which closed its doors for the morning service and joined with the Baptists to celebrate the function.
