OWEN SOUND, Ont., Oct. 14.—(Spe OWEN SOUND, Ont., Oct. 11.—(Special).—In a terrific snow storm, accompanied by a southwest gale, the Canadian Pacific Railway steamer Athabasca, Capt. Alex. Brown, went on a shelving rock at the Flower Pots Island, 80 miles from here, shortly after one o'clock this morning. The steamer cleared at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon on her regular trip up to Fort William. She had a cargo of about six hundred tons of general merchandise and two first-class passenchandise and two first-class passen-gers, and one second class, on her list. The crew number 56. Word of her mishap was brought to this port by the company's steamer Assinibola, which passed the stranded vessel on her way down from Fort. William at 6.30 this morning. Capt. Brown reported that the water was four feet deep in the forward hold, the ship's bow being 50 feet on a flat rock, with the main part affect in 15 fathoms of water. The spot is within 200 feet of the lighthouse and half a mile from the regular course.
