GRAIN ONCE AGAIN ON UPWARD COURSE

Freight Congestion and Export Demand for Foodstuffs Give Fresh Impetus.

Chicago, May 14.—Pessimism regarding the outlook for improved transportation, together with active export demand for breadstuffs, gave decided strength to the corn market today. Prices swung to the upward point yet this average. The finish was unsteady, 1 3/4 to 3/8 net higher, with July 1 1/4 to 1 1/8, and September 1 1/4 to 1 1/8. The outcome ranged from ten cents decline to 25 cents advance.

Wheat traders appeared to be much impressed by statements of a leading railway official that there was little prospect of better railway traffic conditions, and that grain prices would therefore remain high. It was argued that the European movement of corn to terminal markets would be July as great in July as at present, and that the buying side of the market continued to be a logical one. Besides, in connection with wheat export, rail or by steamer, estimates were current that 1,000,000 bushels of wheat had been booked for Europe within 24 hours, and that flour was also being keenly sought for transatlantic use.

Corn ascended 1/4 cent in the absence of any special opposition. Foreign selling of hard had a depressing effect on the market, but the strength of grain led afterward to rally.
