

THOUSANDS FOLLOW BODY TO THE TOMB. Funeral of Sir George Williams, Founder of Y. M. C. A. IN LONDON TO DAY. Buried Beneath Dome of St. Paul's Cathedral in Presence of Immense Throng of Mourners --- Messages of Sympathy and Floral Tributes From All Over World.
