## Is This The Royal Edward?

Berlin, Sept. 3.—"Telegrams from Sofia," says the Overseas News Agency, "states that off the entrance to the Dardanelles, a British transport struck a mine and sank with 320 officers, 1,250 soldiers and 300 members of the crew, all of them drowned. Six hundred bodies were recovered."

It is uncertain whether this refers to the sinking of the Royal Edward, or to the loss of another transport.

Nicholson, of the Windsor hotel, all of St. John, will leave Saturday evening for Halifax where they will take a course in military training fitting them for commissions as lieutenants. ## SHAW'S VIEWS ON COMPULSORY SERVICE

London, Sept. 3.—The Daily Sketch publishes the following letter, written by G. Bernard Shaw, to a fellow Socialist on the subject of compulsory service:

"I don't think anybody is justified in asking anybody else to join the army. It is a serious question, which every man should decide for himself."

"It seems to me that all Socialists should advocate compulsory national service, both civil and military, but compulsory soldiering is another matter. A soldier is a slave without rights of any kind. There is no reason why the work of the army should not be done by citizens with full civil rights."

The Fredericton Campaign

Major Frank Day, formerly a professor in the U. N. B., and late of Carnegie Institute, arrived in the city this morning, and will be a speaker at tonight's meeting in King Square. Speaking of the campaign for men in Fredericton, he said that it was going with a lively swing and gave promise of much success. An energetic committee was now at work and the people were awakening to a sense of their responsibilities in the war crisis. At a meeting of the board of trade there tonight it was expected that action would be taken on the suggestion made by Michael McDade, of St. John, relative to a thorough canvass by districts with an active committee in each district to learn the names of all men available, particularly the young men. One hundred and fifty business men were expected to take this canvass and find the names of those ready to serve, those detained by family ties and those unable to go for other reasons.

## UNITED STATES WILL MAKE NO MOVE FOR PEACE JUST YET

Authoritative Announcement Follows Cardinal's Call—Both Sides Must First Wait

Washington, Sept. 3.—The United States will make no further efforts to bring about peace in Europe, until it has received word that its good offices will be welcomed by both sides in the conflict. This was stated authoritatively here today.

From the fact that the Vatican is in close touch with Austria the construction is that the Germanic powers would be willing to discuss peace at this time. It was said by those in close touch with the administration that similar word will have to be received from Great Britain and her allies before the president will make any further move.
