YACHT BUILT IN N. S., ON TRIP TO COWES, ENGLAND

One of Crew Enlisted in Canadian Army and Came Home a Colonel—Will Follow Aviator's Course.

(Associated Press.)

New York, Aug. 6.—William Washburn Nutting, a motorboat publisher of Beachurst, L. I., who recently departed from New York aboard his craft "Typhoon" for Cowes, England, took with him a crew of amateur sailors.

"Typhoon" is a new yacht built at the laboratories of Dr. Alexander Graham Bell, Biddick, Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, Canada, from designs by William Atkin. She is a forty-five foot craft with a beam of fourteen feet and auxiliary powered for use only in case of calm weather.

The crew consists of Nutting, F. W. Baldwin, the head of Dr. Bell's laboratories, "Jim" Dorsett, Baldwin's right hand man, and a Canadian, who joined the Canadian Expeditionary Force as a private and came back an acting colonel with distinction, it is said. "Typhoon" will sail approximately the course taken by Alcock and Brown in their famous airplane voyage from Newfoundland to the British Isles. This is far north where there is plenty of wind and usually plenty of sea with Mr. Nutting expected to arrive at Cowes in time to attend the races for the British International Trophy, for which an American team of three boats has challenged and which will take place starting August 10. Later the "Typhoon" party will sail for the United States via the southern coast, stopping at the Azores and Bermuda.

LOCAL NEWS

The Hurwitz and Speight liquor cases were up in the police court yesterday afternoon and were again postponed. In the former case Mrs. Hurwitz said that there was no liquor sold there. The Speight case was postponed until this afternoon for judgment.

Many old friends of W. L. Caldwell who at one time was accountant of the Bank of British North America in this city, will be glad to learn that he is coming back to St. John as manager of the Standard Bank, which is taking over the premises at the corner of King and German streets.

A decision to remove their telephone has been reached by growers and merchants on the West Side, who met recently. There were twenty merchants present and they were unanimous in agreeing that the new rates were too big a financial burden to be undertaken.

Superintendent Devanish, C. N. R., has concluded his investigation of the circumstances in connection with the recent train wreck, but has not yet given out his findings. J. W. McCourt, Arthur O'Brien and Gerard Lawlor, brakeman on the shunter have been returned to duty.

The record long distance trip by motor car so far as St. John is concerned is believed to have been made by C. E. Pines who, with his wife and two children, arrived in the city yesterday from Rio Janeiro, a trip of approximately 2,000 miles by overland highways. The party boarded the steamer Express last evening and plan to tour the Annapolis Valley and other parts of Nova Scotia.

The members of the delegation from the West Indies conference in Ottawa feel confident that a statement with respect to the proposed steamship service with the West Indies should read not "from Halifax or St. John," but "Halifax and St. John."

The proposed new service is a weekly one, taking the place of the fortnightly sailings, the boats to go directly from St. John and Halifax.

More than three thousand people enjoyed the two band concerts which were given in the city last night. The Cornet band, under the direction of Frank Waddington, delivering an excellent programme in the Victoria Square, North end, and the St. Mary's band, with Harold Williams leading the baton, providing pleasure for more than two thousand people in King's Square. A clear sky and excellent summer weather added considerably to the pleasure of the evening.
