LONDON POLICE, POORLY PAID, GET INCREASE

London, Aug. 15.—Increased pay has been granted the London "bobby," to take effect on August 31. Even at that the most efficient police body in the world, at least when it comes to handling street traffic, is not paid well, since the minimum "will" be \$7.50 and the maximum \$10 a week. This is an increase of five shillings. Proportionate increases are made in the salaries of the highest officers and in pensions.
