



Thus the Boston Herald notes that since April 1 no less than 1,200 woodland fires have been discovered from the twenty observation towers that are maintained by the state forest service and with but few exceptions these fires have been quickly suppressed due to their prompt discovery. In our own state the fire patrol ser-vice is being continually improved hut there must be more than this service if the state is to be virtually free from the great loss that comes from forest fires, a loss that is by no means confined to the value of the timber destroyed.
