### DOCTORS FROM ALL OVER WORLD

Seven Thousand Visiting Medical Men in London

CONGRESS NEXT MONTH

Appointment of Archbishop of York's Son to Important Post—Home-makers' Union for Married Women of England

(Times' Special Correspondence)  
London, July 22.—There will be seven thousand more doctors than usual in London during the second week of August. They will come from nearly every civilized country, with the probable exception of China, and they will all be taking part in the eighteenth International Congress of Medicine at the Albert Hall and other buildings in South Kensington.

This congress is such a colossal affair that its general programme of subjects for discussion forms a pamphlet of fifty-eight closely printed pages, and the separate papers to be read, the extra "independent" papers, presumably to be taken as read, and the "demonstrations" to be seen reach the astonishing total of 697.

So enormous is the range of medical science at the present day that the congress is divided into no fewer than twenty-three sections, and in some of these sections there are as many as forty subjects for discussion.

It is a sign of the time that the diseases of children are given a section to themselves, and the new science of radiology enjoys the same distinction.

The history of medicine has provoked sixty-nine professors and doctors to take up the pen, and the variety of their subjects is as curious as that of a madman's delirium.

An Important Post

The king, on the recommendation of the home secretary, has appointed Basil

More Thompson inspector of prisons and secretary to the prison commission, to be assistant commissioner of the metropolitan police in place of Sir Melville Macnaghten, at the head of the Criminal Investigation Department of Scotland Yard.

Mr. Thompson, who is a son of the late Archbishop of York, was formerly in the colonial service, and acted as prime minister of Tonga. Subsequently he was made governor of Dartmouth Prison, a position which he vacated to become governor of Wormwood Scrubs Prison in 1907.

His knowledge of the conditions of the penal system qualified him for the post of secretary to the prison commission. He is the author of several books, including "Prisons and Prisoners," and has also published a work on Dartmouth Prison.

The late Marquis of Northampton was a cherished friend of Bret Harte. This writer, apart from the keen pleasure he always felt in the companionship of Lord Compton (as he then was), loved at Compton Wynyates "to gaze upon the famous chimneys all worked in spires and gables, and to muse over the far-away lore in which the whole place is enveloped." Here, too, "he would pour over the brave days of old, and conjure up pictures of that fierce fight at Edgehill." Reminiscences of these visits may be found in "The Desborough Connection" and "The Ghosts of Stukeley Castle."

Home Makers' Union

Married women all over the country are being urged to join a "Home-makers' Union," which expects to become a powerful organization. Crofton has the distinction of being the first London branch of the new union.

The idea originated with Mrs. Woods, an advanced woman worker, of Stockwell, who assured a press representative that husbands need have no fear of the union; its object was simply to help poor working men in their battle against the terrible oppression of the wicked middle classes.

She went on to describe a truly Gilbertian picture of a deputation of members of the union waiting on a recalcitrant husband in order to hasten his reform. Mrs. Woods said the deputation was one of her ideas. That course would be taken in the case of husbands who do not give their wives a reasonable proportion of their income.

"We are out to assist our husbands," she said, "and if by our help they are able to obtain better conditions and wages it is only fair that we should obtain a share of the increased earnings. Of course, there are great problems which we have not yet gone into, but

where this is not found to be the case I should imagine that it would be possible for a deputation from our union to approach the husband and point out to him the unfairness of his action."

"If that had no effect we could then wait upon his own trade union, and get pressure brought to bear on him by the union. In the case of drunken husbands we could help their wives by means of the law."

Other objects mentioned in the union's literature are—

To protest against bad conditions of work, or sell dishonest goods.

To boycott tradespeople who are bad employers, who raise prices unnecessarily, or sell dishonest goods.

The union is to establish a central meeting place where meals can be served and young children cared for.

**VOYE HALF MILLION**

**MORE FOR EXPOSITION**

San Diego, Cal., July 22.—By a vote of 16 to 1, with half the voting population this city passed a bond issue of nearly a million dollars for completion of the San Diego Panama-California Exposition on the lines made necessary by the government requirements and the needs of the states and countries that have decided to participate therein.

The original fund was a stock subscription of \$1,000,000. Then came a bond issue of \$1,000,000. Both these funds are about half expended; \$600,000 of the bond issue remaining in the treasury. The work of organization developed early that the funds were not sufficient if all the states and countries that notified the exposition of their coming really came.

The capital stock was increased by \$2,000,000, making the total capitalization \$3,000,000, with \$1,150,000 fully subscribed. On July 22 it was decided to make another bond issue of \$850,000, and this bond issue has just been made. San Diego, therefore, has all the money she needs with which to finish her exposition. Governments and states will, of course, spend their own funds.

**NEW YORK POLICEMAN**

**LAZZERO BY THUGS**

New York, July 22.—Friends of James Lyons, eighteen years old, who also is known as James Lyons, of No. 179 East 114th street, lazzero policeman John Caselli, when he arrested Lyons at 111th street and First avenue. Several men held the rope which had been thrown about Caselli's neck. Caselli, holding his prisoner with his left hand, swung his right arm under the rope, reached for his revolver and fired two shots at his captors. The prisoners' friends fled and Caselli bound Lyons with the rope and took him to the East 104th street station.

Lyons was held on a charge of assault and robbery. It is alleged that he attempted to hold up and rob Irving Reines and Miss Julia Wasserman in Central Park on June 24. Reines was wounded by a bullet which, it is alleged, Lyons fired.

Justice Goff, of New York city, empaneled a jury of 12 lawyers to try a divorce case. A jury composed together of members of the profession is said to be unprecedented.

### MORNING LOCALS

Miss I. Purvis, daughter of John J. His purpose in coming here is to endeavor to interest members of labor unions in the proposed purchase of the street railway by the Toronto Light Company's plants about Oct. 15, according to an announcement made by Mayor Hocken tonight.

Edward McCarthy, an employee of the James Robertson Co., Lower Cove, met with a slight accident while at work yesterday afternoon, when a shovel fell off one of the shelves in the warehouse, inflicting a nasty scalp wound, which bled profusely. He was taken to Dr.

J. S. Bentley's office, where the wound was dressed and he was able to go to his home with the assistance of a fellow employee.

**MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES**

The House of Lords yesterday threw out the Welsh church disestablishment bill before it had been given a second reading, voting 243 to 46 to have it submitted to the country before being acted upon.
