**NEW YORK'S WONDERFUL TREASURES**

Rivals Any Other City Ancient or Modern—\$250,000,000 in Gems and \$300,000,000 in Works of Art

According to an estimate made at the Custom House within the last few days, New York's collection of precious jewels is far greater than that in any other city in the world, ancient or modern. The gems are valued at \$250,000,000, and the works of art at \$300,000,000.

Within thirty days recently over \$1,500,000 in diamonds were found in Europe, and they have been pouring in at the rate of \$30,000,000 to \$40,000,000 a year for many weeks. The largest number of large numbers of emeralds gems that find their way here.

Since 1871 more than \$700,000,000 worth of diamonds have been dug out of the blue city of South Africa and more than one quarter of them have been acquired by New Yorkers.

Here are some of the New York women who own the most valuable jewels in the world:

Fredericton, N. B., Aug. 18.—(Special)—Preparations for the re-dedication of Christ Church Cathedral during the visit of the Duke of Cornwall here on Saturday next are proceeding satisfactorily and it promises to be the most impressive ceremony held there since the dedication sixty years ago.
