The Blanca, Encalada, Esmerald and Huascar used their heavy guns, while the transports kept their mitrailleuses busily employed.

Tremendous destruction followed, and at 10 a.m. fire broke out in a nitrate warehouse, which was extinguished by the fire brigade. Another fire broke out later and spread until the whole central part of Iquique, where the best stores and buildings were situated, was burned. Among the buildings burned are the Hotel de la Bolsa, the Iquique Saloon, the English Hotel, the mercantile establishments of James Ingalls, Blair & Co., Carlos Wilson, Granja, Pominguez & Lacalle, Capella Enos, the English Club and the office of John Dawson.

The fight which caused the fire was a stern and bloody tragedy, and it would have been prolonged had not the chiefs of the two parties reached an agreement tunder which the opposition leaders engaged to pay Colonel Soto \$10,000 to divide among his men, who were to join the rebels. Under this arangement the Government troops abandoned their arms and dispersed. SECOND EDITION. **GRIP EPIDEMIC IN CHICAGO**

Norses Sick and Undertakers Crowded with Work—Serious State of Affairs Reported in Plitsburg In New York City.

Chicago, Ill., March 24.—The grip epidemic is unabated in this city, and the mortality continues appalling.

Up to midnight the deaths for two weeks aggregated 1540, or 35 per thous and, which is unprecedented in the history of Chicago. Nearly all died from climatic complaints.

Drug stores have been compelled to increase their force of clerks. Undertakers are crowded with work, and many funerals are taking place as early as 7 a. m. and as late as twilight.
