vote had been taken, the work aber should have been set aside, taken as between the remaining unless any one object received at he lowest of these three objects ut, and a third vote should have remaining two, so that one or the

other should have had the support of a majority of the Board. For who shall say that by the help of the suffrages originally given for the two objects cast out, a majority would not have been given for the Calgary Endowment Fund, or even for the Algoma Pension Fund.

This is a thing which occurs continually in ballots, and it is a matter for deep regret that this vote was not properly taken. For, according to the method employed, if seven delegates had woted for each of three objects and eight for the remaining object, then eight delegates out of twentynine would have secured the prize-a case shewing quite plainly that the system adopted was defective. No doubt we are devoting our funds to a good object, and we may well trust that God's blessings will rest upon our work; but I am not sure that we are obliged, without some further vote, to go on applying all our money in this one direction; and I must express my earnest hope that we shall. as soon as possible, get into the way of exerting all our powers to raise funds, not for objects of our own choosing, but for the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Board. It would be far better, in my opinion, to give all our energies (1) to prayer for God's blessing and (2) to the collecting of funds; and then to send the results of our labours unappropriated to the Domestic and Foreign Mission Board, leaving to that Board the very great responsibility of making at its half yearly meetings, a profitable and equitable distribution. This course is, I understand, being already adopted by our St. Matthew's Branch, and I hope we shall gradually all get to follow the same course. I know it is often suggested that we can collect larger sums for special objects, but it is certainly our great duty rather to lead people to feel an interest in the general cause, and we can do this if we bring before them what is being done in the whole field assisted by the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Board.

And now, to turn to a different and more agreeable subject: It is a matter of real pleasure to me to be able to report that with ease and eagerness the usual sum of \$50 has been subscribed, and that, consequently, we are able to-day to present a free life membership to Mrs. Bell Irvine, who has done so much for the Quebec Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, not merely by her exact and untiring fulfilment of her onerous duties as Diocesan Treasurer, but by her constant and burning interest in the Missionary cause. I am
