CHATHAM, N. B., AUGUST 5, 1880. The Lumber Imports in Great Britain.

Although navigation was late in opening this year in the ports of Northern Europe, as well as on this side of the Atlantic, the arrivals of deals and timber in Great Britain have aggregated more for the first six months of 1880 than in any previous year, exceeding those of 1874 and 1878, which were among the heaviest years known to the trade.

Deals in Great Britain. The British Timber Trades Journal of 17th July, says:—Looking for data to be obtained from the circulars of the larger wood brokers at our chief ports, the same cry is heard everywhere—moderate trade and large supplies, with great difficulty in obtaining saving prices on wholesale transactions.
