RACES AT NASHUA.
NASHUA, N. H., Sept. 6.—Of the
four harness events at the Nashua fair
today, two came over from yesterday,

favorite, was obliged to go two extra
heats before capturing the race, four
heats having been held over yesterday.
The 215 pace, which also came over
with four heats, went to Corona.

vorite, was not a factor until the fourth
heat, when the mare finished second,
after which the race went over. Ben
Congo, the picked horse in the 215
went two heats in fine shape, but in the
next two Ray Del Blabio finished
strong in the lead. Darkness then
stopped the sport.

RACES AT HARTFORD.

HARTFORD, Conn., Sept. 6.—By
winning a heat today, Angiola cap-
tured the classic Charter Oak trot and
Charles Oak park before a big throng

of spectators. Four heats were run
yesterday, Angiola winning the last
two. The heat which decided the race
today was a good one until the dis-
tance pole was reached, when the west-
ern mare pulled away from Zephyr,
her close rival. The purse was dis-
tributed as follows: Angiola, \$5,000;
Zephyr, \$2,500; Norman B., \$1,500, and
Glenwood M., \$1,000. Sadie Mac, who
dropped dead in the fourth heat yes-
terday, was buried this afternoon in
the horse graveyard at the track, and
it is said that her owner, Miss Kath-
erine L. Wilkes, will erect a tablet at the
grave.

CHOLERA SPREAD FROM DANCE HALL.

HAMBURG, Sept. 6.—The authori-
ties trace the latest case of cholera
here to the source of the other two.
When the Russian emigrants came to
Hamburg they were permitted to enter
the town where they visited a dance
hall. The American regulations require the
detention of emigrants from an in-
fected country for five days, which is
the period of incubation for cholera,
while the company here detains all
emigrants bound for the United States
for at least six days. I shall have no
hesitation in giving a clean bill of
health to the Graf Waldersee, for the
thousand emigrants now detained on
the Bulgaria in midstream below Ham-
burg."

St. Francis Xavier Honors Many
Distinguished Men—Brilliant Care-
monies Attended Golden Jubilee

ANTIGONISH, N. S., Sept. 6.—The
opening exercises in connection with
the celebration of the golden jubilee of
the University of St. Francis Xavier
College began this afternoon with an
address by His Lordship Bishop Cam-
eron, chancellor of the university. The
address dealt exhaustively with the
history of the institution, the great
and good work the college had done
for the cause of education in eastern
Nova Scotia, and tenderly referred to
the happy relations that exist between
it and the sister institutions else-
where.

The baccalaureate sermon was
preached at the cathedral tonight by
Rev. Dr. Morrison of Charlottetown.
The lord bishop was celebrant with

of the college as deacon and sub-deacon
respectively. The cathedral was packed
to overflowing, as was the college rink
and Mount St. Bernard's Convent in the
afternoon. Subsequently the lord
bishop tendered a reception to the vis-
itors on the convent grounds. The re-
ception was very largely attended, the
grounds being beautifully decorated
and brilliantly lighted for the occasion.
There is a great throng of people in
town attending the celebration, which
closes tomorrow night with a grand
ball by members of the graduating
class. The athletic sports will be held
in the afternoon.

held just fifty years ago today, and his
lordship Bishop Cameron presided on

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Sept. 6.—The
Peary expedition's auxiliary steamer

Greenland, last night, reporting that

mander Peary on board, left Cape
Sabine for the north August 21.
Officers of the Erik fear that the
Roosevelt will not get very far north
this winter, conditions in the northern
waters being adverse. Ice floes are
unusually heavy and much had been
had prevailed. On the voyage to
Greenland the Roosevelt proved an
exceedingly satisfactory vessel.
