HIS THRILLING ESCAPE

Lucky Shot in Dark Saved Man From Bear.

On Getting Out of Bed Thomas Allen of Revelstoke Was Accused to Find Big Animal Close by.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 8.—A lucky shot in the dark saved Thomas Allen, of Revelstoke, from becoming food for a bear. Allen was staying with his brother at the latter's ranch at Eagle Pass. About 3 a. m. he was awakened by the house door being opened. On getting out of bed to see who the intruder was, he was astonished to see an enormous brown bear standing about six feet away. Reaching for his rifle, which was hanging over his bed, Allen fired at the brute, the bullet penetrating the breast and breaking its back. There were no more cartridges in the house, and the wounded bear lay in the doorway, tearing everything to pieces within reach of its paws. At daybreak Allen crawled through the window of his bedroom and ran to William Mackay's house, about a mile away, got another rifle, and killed the bear. It was fortunate that the shot in the dark was effective. Had it not been, the bear's back and prevented its walking. Allen would have been in the hands of the bear. Robert Ewel, of Hardy Mountain, near Grand Forks, recently had almost as hair-raising an experience as Allen. He tramped his horse in two weeks. The last, a big fellow, measuring more than seven feet from tip to tip, had only one foot caught in a steel trap and started a boxing match as soon as Ewel got near. The trapper had only a pole shot and a broken rifle, which he used to secure a knockout. Every time he struck at the bear, the bear dodged and came back with a vicious strike with the unencumbered paw. After half an hour's sparring Ewel managed to land a blow on the head with the pick which put the bear to his final sleep. Prospects all over the province report that bears are pretty numerous this season. The crop of bear stories has been unusually large this year as a consequence. A New Zealand bear named MacAdams recently brought from Lillooet the fur of a large grizzly which he got after a six days' hunt. It now adorns the wall of the smoking room of the Elks' Club.

CUT HIS FRIEND'S THROAT IN DISPUTE OVER A BALL GAME.

Horrible Murder Committed by a Young Lad at Hartford.

HARTFORD, Conn., Sept. 8.—Losing his temper during a dispute over a ball game, Francis Curtin, 17 years old, cut the throat of Robert S. Jardine, while the latter was standing in a doorway of the Hartford Hotel. The victim's head from his body by a stroke of a razor. SALE OF REGINA LAND.

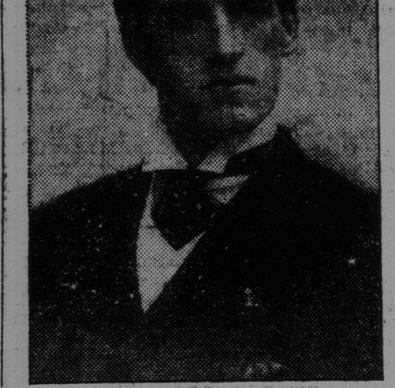
The Price Paid One Thousand Dollars a Foot.

CANADA A RIVAL OF THE U. S. IN ELECTRICAL MACHINERY.

The largest generator ever made in this country has just been made ready for shipment to British Columbia from the works of the Canadian Westinghouse Company, of Hamilton. The purchaser is the British Columbia Electric Railway Company, of Vancouver. The generator is 2,000 horse-power, 3 phase, 7,200 alternations, 200 type for direct connection with the water wheel. The order also includes one rotary converter of 1,250 horse-power, 530 volts, 3 phase, 7,200 alternations, 400 revolutions per minute, and eight air blast transformers each of 725 horse-power, 2,200 volts to 24,200 volts, 7,200 alternations. The necessary switch boards and regulating and controlling devices were also manufactured in this plant, and will be shipped with the balance of the order in the course of a day or two. The new machinery is required by the Vancouver company to provide the added power to meet the ever increasing demand of Vancouver and vicinity. It is the fourth generator of the size ordered by the Vancouver company, but the other three were supplied by the Westinghouse Company from its Pittsburgh works previous to the building of the Hamilton works. The one now ready for shipment is by long odds the largest ever manufactured in Canada.

BROKE HIS ARM WHILE RUNNING A RACE.

DIGBY, N. S., Sept. 8.—A serious accident occurred at the Digby Baptist Sunday school picnic, held at Port Wade yesterday. While a number of boys were racing Roy, the twelve-year-old son of Captain C. F. Lewis, master of the George L., ran into a tree and broke his left arm just above the wrist. The steamer made a special trip across the harbor and a physician met the boat at the government pier and set the bones.
