KILLED IN BOSTON.

A telegram received at Riverside yesterday conveyed intelligence of the death, in a trolley car accident at Boston, of Peter McClelan, son of the late Edward McClelan of Riverside, and nephew of Lieut. Governor McClelan. The young man was about 30 years of age, and had been living in the States for several years. Three sisters of the deceased—Mrs. Capt. H. A. RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

Regular Train on the Salisbury and Harvey Road Jumped the Rails.

The regular frain on the Salisbury and Harvey road, which leaves Albert about 10 a. m., met with a nasty accident about a mile the other side of Hillsboro. Eight cars loaded with plaster and one passenger car left the track, tearing up the rans and sleepers for a distance of about one hundred yards. The passengers were considerably shaken up, but no one was hurt. Had the accident occurred a short distance further on, there would pro-bably have been a terrible loss of life, as at that point there is a sheer drop

as at that point there is a sheer drop of about fifty feet.

The passengers were taken to Hillsboro on the engine, and from there were sent to Salisbury in a box car. The road is evidently not prepared for emergencies of this kind, a fact that the half dozen passengers found out before they reached their destination.
