

Never Saw Instructors Under Influence of Liquor.

Many Witnesses Were Examined at Sussex Yesterday.

SUSSEX, May 30.—The investigation into the management of the provincial dairy school and into the charges preferred by Mr. Eveleigh, the manager, against certain of the instructors, was continued today in the dairy school building here. Premier Tweedie presided. Hon. S. White appeared on behalf of the superintendents and W. B. Jonah and Geo. W. Fowler, M. P., for Mr. Eveleigh. Eight witnesses were examined, including Mr. Eveleigh, whose evidence had been given in part at the last meeting. No very startling evidence was adduced on either side and nothing of importance was proven one way or the other. The farmers who gave evidence were for the most part quite satisfied with Mr. Eveleigh's management of the factory, while on the other hand they had nothing to say against the superintendents. Mr. Eveleigh, who wrote the letter containing the charges now being investigated, showed a considerable disposition to retract as much as possible for the sake of peace and harmony. "What he had intended however, concerning the use of intoxicating drinks by some of the instructors he felt that he could not withdraw.

The first witness called was Richard McCready. He said he had been a cheese maker at Gagetown for four years. He attended the Sussex dairy school in 1904. While he was in school he never saw any of the instructors under the influence of liquor. While at Gagetown he was frequently visited by Mr. Mitchell. He always found Mr. Mitchell ready and willing to assist him. To Mr. Jonah witness said he had never had any complaints from his patrons concerning the weight of cream, except on one occasion.

Nelson Tait, butter maker at Elgin, said that he had been at the dairy school in 1903. While here he never noticed any signs of liquor on the superintendents. While he was in charge of the creamery at Elgin he was visited by Mr. Mitchell once. Witness had worked in the Sussex creamery for eighteen months under Mr. Eveleigh.

Napoleon LeBlanc, butter maker at Memramook, was examined. He had attended the school only one year. He considered the instructors competent. He had only had one month's experience at butter making.

The next witness was Frank McCready. He had attended the school in 1903. He saw no indications that the instructors had ever been using intoxicants.

Nelson Eveleigh, manager of the Sussex factory, was then called, and the examination of the witnesses continued. He was questioned at some length with regard to his method of making the weights of milk on slips and entering them on the sheets and on the books. He remembered one occasion where a sheet came nearly being lost. Regarding the pipettes used in the factory, witness said as far as he knew they were always used the same size of pipette. He was not aware that one kind of cream required one size of pipette, and another kind another size. He had been acting on the assumption that the same size could properly be used for all the cream. Witness said the instructors had complained about the separator not being in good condition nearly every spring. He had not considered the machines unfit to use nor unsafe. They had been sent away each spring and repaired. The machines in use now were both De Laval's. Witness said during the last two years he had handled feed at the request of the farmers, and sold it to them, cheaper than the other merchants. He did not think he averaged \$30 a car on the feed. With the feed he also handled some flour, which he kept in the dairy building until an act was passed in the local house forbidding him to do so. Regarding the letter written to Mr. Smith, M. KILLED BY TRAIN.
Robert McCourt Struck by
Fredericton Express.

Jury Find Verdict of Accidental
Death.

A fatal accident occurred in Fairville Wednesday, when Robert McCourt was struck by the Fredericton express and died from his injuries a short time afterwards.

The meeting was adjourned at 12 o'clock. At 2 p. m. the investigation was resumed. Mr. Eveleigh was allowed to stand aside, and Austin Lockhart was called. He had graduated at the Sussex school and had since been engaged mostly in Nova Scotia. While at the school he understood the instructions to be under the influence of liquor. Herbert Parlee, barrister of the supreme court, and also a farmer and dealer in thoroughbred stock, was called next. He had been bringing milk or cream to the Sussex factory ever since it opened. In the year 1904 he thought his tests had averaged about 30 per cent. In the summer it went up, he thought, to about 33 or 34 per cent. In the fall he had changed the screw in the separator, but he did not think it changed the test for some time afterwards.

To Mr. Jonah witness said he was speaking from memory only. He would not swear within four or five points of what his tests were any time that he was in the factory. He had an ordinary adjustment of the machine would increase the amount of cream. He agreed there were several things which might interfere with the cream tests. The fact of his percentage of cream increasing in the spring of 1904 he attributed to the fact that different hands turned the machine.

C. W. J. Upham was the next witness. He produced a record of his tests at the factory, beginning with the year 1903. In January, February and March, 1905, he got a test of 27 per cent. He thought this unprofitable and in May, when he got a test of 30 per cent, he deducted a 4 per cent for leaving the factory. This was 3 per cent of the money he received since Jan. 1st, 1905. This he thought was according to one of the by-laws of the company. Witness said when he was home he always turned his own separator. When away his foreman turned it. He could not swear whether or not there were variations in the turning of the machine on account of the change of hands.

Regarding the falling off of his test in November last, witness said he would not think this falling off was not due to the change of rows in turning the machine, or rather the man behind it, was to blame. Questioned concerning the fine imposed by the company on those leaving the factory, witness did not know just what the intention of the company was in making this by-law. He thought, however, that if he had just cause for complaint and left the factory he should not have to pay it. He did not know definitely of any person also leaving the factory under the same circumstances as himself.

The investigation was adjourned about 10 p. m., to open again on Friday at 10 a. m.

OTTAWA, May 28.—Sir Frederick Borden has given notice for Wednesday to provide that the salary of the commandant of the Royal Military College shall not exceed \$3,200, together with the salaries of the staff adjutant, professors, instructors, assistant instructors and staff shall be fixed and may be reduced from time to time by the governor in council; also that it is expedient to amend the militia act and to provide that the permanent forces may be increased to five thousand men.
