He said the Captain where he was from, he was 30 days from Cuba bound to Cadiz. He then went into the cabin: "I observed," he said, "all kinds of arms, and 12 officers apparently besides the 4 in the boat. She had 4 guns mounted and loaded, with the tomkins out, 2 12 pounders and two long 18 pounders. I observed 12 muskets all along the deck, and 12 pikes likewise. There were 12 breechings attached to the side bolts of 7 ports amidships—there was top-sail yard all ready fitted with foot poles and braces. Mocha attached, top-gallant yard ditto, and the great guns were all ready to fire. I saw 12 sprays of shot to the deck, and fished—I asked one of the officers, he spoke English where they were bound to, and he told me to Bourdeaux, that they were in ballast, and that they would take 12 tons of shot, and would go on board and proceed on my voyage, but to recollect, that he must have part of my provisions—at 3 pm. sent his boat on board with me, with an officer and 12 men, and 12 muskets, and 12 pikes. I said, however, I got him put off with 3 pieces of beef, 1-4 barrel of herring, some dolphin and anchovy fish that they forced for herring and helped themselves with. I then asked him to furnish me with 12 muskets made sail and passed to windward, then bore up to the westward—at 5 pm. he tacked to the N. E. passed close to windward, bid me good bye, fired his guns, and I then reached the coast of Spain in the morning of 14th.
