## JOHNSTON NOT GUILTY

Cases before the Circuit Court yesterday and the judgments.

The Circuit Court resumed its sittings yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, when the case of the King vs. John Johnston came on and occupied the whole day. The prisoner, a man of over sixty, was accused of four separate crimes: First, of having had carnal knowledge of Marjorie Dowdell, a girl under the age of fourteen years; second, of unlawfully attempting to have carnal knowledge of Rosella Stafford, a girl under the age of fourteen years; third, of indecent assault on Marjorie Dowdell, the principal girl in the case, her examination was interrupted by the adjournment of the court until 2.30 o'clock p.m.

W. F. Roberts, M. D., was the first witness examined in the afternoon. Then R. G. Murray, counsel for the defence, cross-examined Marjorie Dowdell. The prisoner took the stand in his own defence, made an absolute denial, and gave evidence that he was physically incapable of committing the crimes charged against him. Mrs. Leslie Singer was a witness for the defence and also Herbert B. Schofield who testified as to the good character of the accused. The jury was composed as follows: M. E. Lane, H. E. Brown, Rupert Taylor, John S. Seaton, K. D. Spear, J. E. Cowan, Jr., J. W. Mullin, A. D. Blakelee, M. J. McCarthy, R. W. Queen, Wellington Cox and Wm. Crabb. They retired at 6.30 and returned in five minutes with a verdict of "not guilty." Court adjourned until 10 o'clock Monday morning.

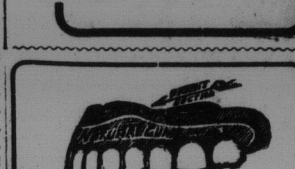

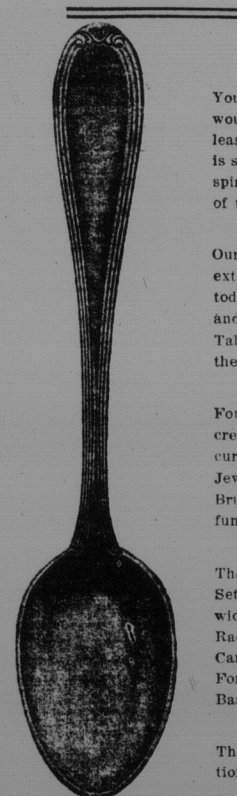
