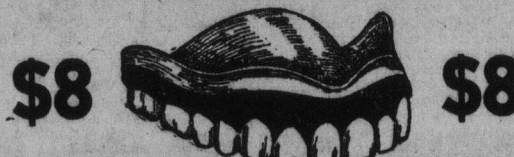

MOVEMENT TO ECONOMIZE ON GOVERNMENT PRINTING

Probable that Editorial Board of Supervisors Will Be Appointed—Plea for Passage of Railways Act—Pelagic Sealing Compensation Brought Up.

Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 18.—In moving that the house concur in various reports made by the joint printing committee, Colonel Currie gave some interesting details of public expenditures in this direction. He said that printing the report on the high cost of living would cost the country \$40,000. Forty thousand dollars, Colonel Currie pointed out, would uniform four battalions of infantry or pay for four aeroplanes. Such expenditures were going on annually and there did not seem to be anyone to turn off the tap. He instanced further a report of the mines branch on a mine in Newfoundland, the printing of which had cost \$5,000, and the mine was not in Canada at all. The printing committee, he went on, had suggested the creation of an editorial board of three members to control departmental printing.

Will Have Editorial Board.
Sir Robert Borden remarked that the suggestions of the committee would receive the best consideration. He indicated that the committee's suggestion in regard to the creation of an editorial board of three members would be adopted, or modified possibly in such a way as to have two or three members of the government associated with it. He was confident that some means would be found to check unnecessary printing.

Sir Sam Hughes, on the orders of the day, called the attention of the minister of militia to the fact that officers and men on leave from the front were not permitted to wear their distinctive divisional and brigade badges. In some cases, Sir Sam said, they had been brusquely ordered to remove them and he wanted to know by whose authority.

Sir Edward Kemp remarked that the badges were merely for purposes of divisional and brigade identification. An imperial order had been issued that the badges should be removed when soldiers left France. He had no information as to any discount in regard to the matter.

Sir Sam Hughes—"I have never seen any such imperial order, although I have tried very hard to find it. I know, as a matter of fact, that officers on leave wear them in England."

The bill to amend the companies act was read a third time.

Military Voters' Act.
The house then considered the amendments made by the Senate to

the military voters' act, which were concurred in.

The Senate amendment to Sir Thomas White's insurance bill was also carried. On motion of the prime minister, second reading was given to Senate bill No. 103, "An act concerning the payment of salaries or wages of employees of railway companies."

The house then went into committee on the bill.

Mr. F. B. Carvell said that the bill appeared to be an exact counterpart of one of the clauses added to the new consolidated railways act. He expressed himself as being heartily in favor of it. Mr. Carvell hoped that the new railways act would be passed this session. He said a great deal of time had been spent by the special committee. A very important change had been made in the bill. It would be most regrettable if all this work had gone for naught, merely because of one or two contentious clauses.

Sir Robert Borden heartily concurred in what Mr. Carvell had said in regard to the great railway commission. He also said it would be regrettable if the work of the railway commission was wasted and it was therefore most desirable that the new railways bill should be passed. If it should not be passed it was important, however, that the act under consideration should be carried.

After reading clause 1 of the bill, on motion of the premier, the committee rose and requested permission to sit later in the day.

Sealing Treaty.

On motion to go into supply, Mr. E. MacDonald said he had a matter of some importance to bring before the house. The matter had to do with the right of the Victoria Sealing Company to compensation under the terms of the pelagic sealing treaty. Mr. MacDonald explained that the Victoria Sealing Company controlled forty-three out of the forty-six boats which were formerly engaged in sealing in the North Pacific Ocean. By the terms of the pelagic sealing treaty between Canada, the United States, Russia and Japan, and signed in 1906, 1911, Canada had undertaken to refrain from engaging in pelagic sealing if compensation amounting to \$7,500,000 for the period of fifteen years was paid her. In all \$200,000 of this amount had been paid by the United States government to the company, but the Victoria Sealing Company had received none of this.

WAS IT A MORTGAGE OR AN ABSOLUTE DEED?

Interesting Point to Be Decided in Case Fixed for Trial on October 1st—Damage to Crops Claimed in Fairville Court.

Before Chief Justice McLeod, in the Chancery Division of the Supreme Court, yesterday, an order was granted for postponement of the hearing in Porter vs. Dale, a Northumberland county case, until October 1st, the plaintiff to pay the costs of the application. The case arises over the execution of a deed, plaintiff setting up that the instrument was executed as a mortgage. The loan, however, was \$10 and the value of the property was \$200. At yesterday's application, Dr. W. B. Wallace, K.C., appeared for Hon. Robert Murray, plaintiff's solicitor, while Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, K.C., and E. P. Williston, K.C., appeared for the defendant.

In the Fairville court, yesterday, before Justice Allingham, in the matter of Maxwell vs. Dean, the plaintiff was examined and adjournment was made until Friday. The plaintiff is asking for \$15, being damage to his crops alleged to have been caused by the defendant's cattle. Daniel Mullin, K.C., appeared for the plaintiff and J. A. LeBlanc for the defendant. Several tilts between counsel enlivened the proceedings.

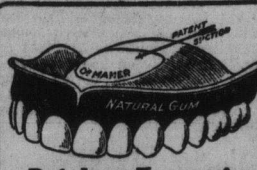
