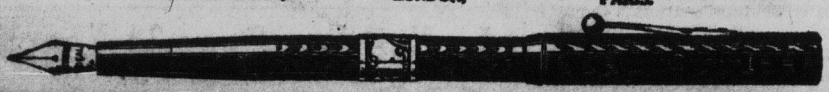

Milk toast, cream soups, creamed vegetables, creamed fish and scalloped dishes are all good ways of putting more milk into the daily food of the family, say home economics specialists in the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The milk for all of these is thickened into a sauce, thick or thin. To make the sauce, melt the fat, stir in the flour, add the milk gradually and cook until thickened, stirring constantly unless a double boiler is used. All measurements are level in these recipes.

Thin White Sauce
Milk, 1 cup.
Flour, 1 tablespoon.
Fat, 1 tablespoon.
Salt, 1/2 teaspoon.
Pepper, 1-2 teaspoon.
Medium White Sauce
Milk, 1 cup.
Flour, 2 tablespoons.
Fat, 2 tablespoons.
Salt, 1/2 teaspoon.
Pepper, 1-2 teaspoon.
Thick White Sauce
Milk, 1 cup.
Flour, 3 tablespoons.
Fat, 3 tablespoons.
Salt, 1/2 teaspoon.
Pepper, 1-2 teaspoon.

MILK PUDDINGS CAN BE ATTRACTIVE

Are Wholesome for Children and Not Unpalatable to Adults.

A list of good milk puddings is given which may be of interest to mothers of growing children.

Junket.
1 qt. milk, 1 junket tablet.
1-2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

1. Heat milk to blood heat.
2. Add sugar and junket tablet dissolved in 1 tablespoon of warm water.

3. Add vanilla. Pour into glass serving cups or into pudding dish and let stand in warm place until set.

4. Chill. Serve with raspberry or black currant jam.

Bread Pudding.
1 qt. milk, 2 eggs.
2 cups bread crumbs.

1-2 teaspoon salt.
1-2 cup melted butter.
Grated rind of lemon.

1. Soak bread crumbs in boiling water.
2. Drain water off.

3. Add sugar, butter, egg yolks, salt, flavoring and milk to buttered crumbs.

4. Bake one hour in a buttered pudding dish in a slow oven.

5. Spread with jam and cover with meringue made from egg whites.

Milk Sherbet.
4 cups milk.
Juice three lemons.

1-2 cups sugar.
1. Mix juice and sugar stirring constantly, while slowly adding milk.

2. If added too quickly mixture will have a curdled appearance.

3. Freeze and serve.

Sage Pudding.
1 qt. scalded milk, 3 eggs.
2-3 cup sage, 1 teaspoon salt.
1-2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

1. Cook sage in scalded milk until clear.
2. Separate eggs, beat yolks with sugar and salt.

3. Pour scalded milk and sage over yolks and sugar, return to double boiler and stir constantly until mixture thickens.

4. Pour at once into a cold bowl, let cool slightly, add vanilla.

5. Beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry, add 2 tablespoons white sugar, beat until sugar is dissolved.

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Halifax Witnessed

Football Game

Scottish International Eleven
Defeated Halifax Scots
Team by 7 to 1 Score.

Halifax, May 21.—Defeating representative Halifax soccer by a score of seven to one, Scottish International eleven of the first game of its Canadian tour on Saturday afternoon demonstrated the art and science of football with an ability simply astounding to a crowd of twenty hundred who for the first time saw a team of international football players in action.

Halifax Played Well.

The Halifax team played excellently, Captain Campbell and Wilson distinguishing themselves particularly, but their attack was itself against beautifully com defense of the Scotsmen. Airy and head work, carried the ball into the territory again and and not swift passing opened way for shots accurate as rifle shots from the boots of Wilson and Rankin. Once Wilson allowed ball to cannon off his head into Halifax goal. On only a few occasions were the Halifax players able to bring the sphere within striking distance of the famous goalie Brodie. He had little to do in the way of defense, but his elegant boot frequently sent the ball sailing half way up field.

Two forty-five minute halves the crowd an idea of the way the game is played in the Old Country.

Souvenir Medals.

After the game was over Governor McCallum Grant presented both teams with souvenir medals. Colonel J. D. Wilson, president of the International, made a brief speech of thanks.

The Scottish team left early morning for Montreal where they were to play on May 24.

The day was quite warm and the heat told on the International players who were obviously not exerting themselves. Wilson scored again immediately in front of the Halifax goal, and toward the end of the repeated after a brilliant piece of individual work. The whistle called further scoring.

The gross receipts of the game were \$1,750, the guarantee to Dominion Football Association amounting to \$1,500.
