New York, Aug. 4.

The British steamer Corinth, from New York, July 15, for Liverpool, is a total wreck off Galley Head, Ireland, all hands saved. The Corinth was a small freight steamer of 900 tons.

LONDON, Aug. 4.

The American base ball players won the game of cricket with the Marylebone club of London, 107 to 105.

The German Government has notified the Versailles Government, protesting against the Pyrenees being made a frontier, and declaring that unless France maintains neutrality on the Spanish question, Germany will ask other powers to interfere.

The St. Croix Regatta and Picnic.

ST. STEPHEN, Aug. 5.

The excursionists from St. John, Woodstock and Fredericton arrived here about 10 o'clock yesterday morning and found the town dressed for a holiday. On Crocker's grounds a picnic was held by the Catholic congregation, and attended by an immense number of people.

An interesting base ball match was played between the Inevincible Club of Portland, N. B., and the St. Croix Club of Milltown, Me.

The regatta was of course, the most interesting feature of the day's sport, and at 4 o'clock p. m. the banks of the St. Croix, and every available spot with its sight of the course, was crowded with spectators.

The men got off at half past four, Brayley leading for the first half mile, when Easters pressed him and passed, taking the lead. Brayley increased his stroke, and at the turning point led by one length and a half. He maintained the lead, winning the race in 15 min. 8 sec.

The four-oared race was at once called off—the prizes being \$125 to first, \$50 to second, and \$25 to third. Crown Prince (spare) rowed by Logan crew of Portland, N. B.; J. H. Rose (shell) by St. Stephen crew; and Dexter (spare) by Lower Cove crew, St. John.

The race was won by the Logan crew after an exciting contest—the St. Stephen crew second, and Lower Cove crew third—in 15.30. The races created considerable excitement, the result of the single scull race being a surprise to all. There is considerable talk of having another race, but no definite arrangements have been made.

After the regatta was over the picnic grounds were again visited. At 6.30 p. m. the trains left for St. John, Fredericton and other parts. No accidents worthy of note marred the day, and every one was pleased with the sports.

REGULATING RITUALISM.

The House of Lords has thrown out an important amendment made by the Commons to the Public Worship Regulation Bill, granting parishioners the right of appeal to an Archbishop in case a Bishop refuses to authorize the prosecution of a clergyman for Ritualistic practices.

GRABING THE BORDER.

It is said that the French troops guarding the Spanish frontier have been reinforced, and vigorous measures ordered to prevent uniformed Carlists from crossing the boundary.

ENGLAND WILL NOT INTERFERE.

It was officially declared in the British House of Commons yesterday that the Government had no intention of taking part in an armed intervention in Spain, and that it had no reason to suppose that other European powers contemplated such a step.

A FALSE REPORT.

The report telegraphed yesterday afternoon that Germany had sent a note to France threatening intervention in case of the continued violation of the frontier by Carlists was subsequently pronounced false.

Police Investigation.

A case occurred yesterday evening at which the Magistrate has ordered an investigation. It seems that John McLaughlin, being a little the worse off liquor, drove his horse on the sidewalk in Union street, and policeman Wilcox ordered him to get off and go home.

He refused to go until he was ready, when Wilcox caught him and threw him on the ground, under the horse's feet. Mr. David Allen, who was in the carriage looking after McLaughlin, told Wilcox to leave him alone and he would go home, but the policeman would not do so and some high words ensued. Wilcox says Mr. Allen assaulted him, and this morning made some information to that effect.

Mr. Allen denies doing anything of the kind, and says he thought he was acting for the best in trying to get the policeman to leave the man alone. He is known to be a quiet and respectable citizen and not a man likely to act contrary to law. The Magistrate refused to hear the charge of assault until the Chief of Police had investigated the charge made by Mr. Allen, of unnecessary violence on the policeman's part.

A museum of the works of innatias was recently opened at an insane asylum near Vienna. The objects exhibited are divided into three classes, the first comprising 215 articles made entirely by the inmates; the second, articles destroyed by them in their moments of frenzy; and the third, models, etc., showing how they are lodged and chained. Among the articles in the first class are delicately carved meerschaum pipes, lace, picture-frames, and a remarkable collection of paintings by Kratky, who, before he became insane, was a celebrated artist at Vienna. These paintings show the signs of insanity, and one of them is a wonderfully life-like representation of the inmates hearing mass in the chapel attached to the asylum. Next to these specimens of the constructive skill of the inmates are placed huge iron bars, bent double, spoons and iron plates broken to pieces, and doors split in half.
