The greatest news since peace was declared arrived in the city this morning—the date of the showing here of the The Better 'Ole is Feb. 17-18-19.


Only One Local Boy on S. S. Grampian

Letters to News Record PROHIBITION.

To the Editor: "If I cannot reform with equity, I will not reform at all," said Edmund Burke on a memorable occasion, but our Prohibitionist friends seemingly have lost their sense of proportion, and incidentally, would have us retrograde from our foremost position as a free and democratic country, where individual taste and liberty may find full expression. Sumptuary legislation cannot be made effective without the great majority of communal sympathy is behind it, and such cannot be said of Canada as a whole regarding Prohibition.

The question of imposing by law, a prohibition of the normal habits of the people—at least a great mass of people—is not only injurious but dangerous in the extreme.

Some may say, is liquor drinking then a right? The answer is, the exercise of normal activities of a human being. The citizens of our country, as the exercise of a right, and because there may be here and there a very small number of people who abuse that right it is no reason why the right of the masses of the people should be denied them by such law as the Prohibition party contemplate putting into effect.

Can anyone truly say that the present prohibitive law is the outcome of spontaneous desire. On the contrary organized labor throughout Canada has repeatedly protested against this iniquitous Act and expressed in no uncertain terms their feelings on this matter.

Of course the Prohibitionist party are very considerate in explaining that they don't want to force prohibition on the people. But that is precisely what they do want to do. Not at present of course.

Not until they get the power. Personally I would heartily support any measure restricting the indiscriminate sale of intoxicants, and just as strongly oppose any act which tends to totally deprive the people of something which is highly beneficial when used in moderation.

Lovers of personal freedom and individual liberty should weigh the things carefully, as the time is near when prohibitionists in Canada emboldened, by their seeming success intend to carry out their mal-droit scheme—if they are allowed.

Decision Probably Will be Set Aside

Proceedings in Brewery Case at Guelph Likely Invalid

When asked to-day by the Record regarding decision of Guelph's Magistrate to cancel the license of the Lion Brewery, Mr. C. H. Huether pointed out two facts. In the first place that the decision was invalid, the company operating under a Dominion government license. Secondly, there were no three charges on which to make such a decision. One of the three charges on which the Guelph Magistrate proceeded had previously been quashed by the Department at Toronto, leaving only two, whereas the law requires three whenever the cancellation of a license is to be made. The charge that had previously been quashed was a Brantford one of December 1917, which was subsequently quashed.

In view of these facts, Mr. Huether stated that the decision of the Guelph Magistrate would probably be set aside. The company it might be added is operating as usual.
