Hadam: -

In reply to your communication of the 14th instant, I beg to say that the Department, when writing you recently, will aware of the fact that there is a Victorian Order nurse emplo by the New England Company at present on the Six Nations Reserve, but as the number of Indians is large (4510 according to the last census), it is thought that there is emple scope for the employment of a second hurse, for which reason the Department has under the consideration the question of such an appointment, and I shall, therefore, be glad to learn from you whether you could provide a nurse for this work. In the event of her engagement, it is thought that she might reside at Ohsweken with the murse now doing duty. The Department's nurse would be under the direction of the salaried medical officer Dr. Davis, and her work would be such as he would allot her. The patients to be treated would be mainly those affected with tuberculosis,

As stated in official letter of the 12th instant, I shall be glad to know what salary the Department would be expected to pay in the event of a murse being employed.
