

from Guelph, and fourteen from Milton. It contains one church, Canada Presbyterian.

Two lime factories one kept by Mr. Edward Bescoby, where seven kilns having a frontage of 200 feet by 25 feet in depth are placed, which burn sixteen thousand barrels of quick, and five thousand barrels of water lime annually, and Mr. James Farquhar's five kilns which burn twenty-four thousand barrels of quick lime annually, he also does a large business in the free stone and flag quarries. John Newton & Sons manufacture all kinds of fancy cloths, and execute custom work.— There are two saw mills, one carried on by Mr. Bescoby, the other by Messrs. John Newton & Sons. In the mercantile department, Mr. T. B. Fraser offers to his customers and the public generally, a first class stock of goods. Mr. Robert Ford, general blacksmith, attends to the public wants in his line with the utmost attention. There is also one tavern and a school house in this village.
