PRAYERS.

A Bill for the cognizance, trial and punishment, of Spies was read a second time. Resolved, That the Bill be committed to a Committee of the whole House.

Mr. Haliburton moved that an Address from this House be presented to Sir John Wentworth, the late Lieutenant-Governor of this Province; which, being seconded and put and the House dividing thereon, there appeared for the motion fifteen; against it twelve:

On motion of Mr. Haliburton, ordered, That Mr. Haliburton, Mr. Ritchie and Mr. Crane, be a Committee for preparing the faid Address.

On motion of Mr. Tonge, refolved, that a further conference be defired with the Council by Committee, on the subject matter of the conference held yesterday, and that the Clerk do request the same.

The Clerk reported that the Council had agreed to the conference as defired by the House immediately in the Committee Room of the Council, and thereupon,

On motion of Mr. Tonge, refolved, that the managers to be appointed to hold the faid conference do fitte to his Majesty's Council, that however complicated the regulations of the Bill under consideration may on the general reading appear to the Council, it will be found on a closer examination they do not tend to retard the organization of the Milicia, and that the system of organization contained in the Laws now in force is adopted in the present Bill with very inconsiderable alterations.

That the House conceive the present session was held for the express purpose of providing for the desence of the Province, as this was the only subject recommended to the attention of the Legislature by his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, in his Speech at the opening of it, and that from the tenor and spirit of this recommendation the House immediately proceeded to prepare such a system as would in their opinion render the Militia efficient for taking their part in the desence of the Province.

That the House are convinced that the adoption of the mensure suggested by His Majesty's Council will not answer this purpose, as it goes only to the discipline of the Militia, without adverting to the equally important points of their equipment with arms—the mode of selection for actual service (in which the present laws are most obviously desicient)—and the regulations for their government when in few desired.
