OBITUARY

MR. STANLEY LAWTON

Mr. Stanley Lawton, one of the most proficient saxophone players in the world, died Tuesday in the General Public Hospital, aged 55 years. For twenty years he played in Sousa's famous band and accompanied the distinguished leader on several world tours, performing for years as a member of Sousa's wonderful saxophone quartette. He also played for a while in the Marine Band of Washington, D. C., and figured conspicuously in other musical organizations of the continent. Mr. Lawton was a native of St. John and the last surviving member of a large family. He was the youngest son of the late William G. Lawton, dry goods merchant. The deceased had been in declining health for about three years when he went to the Hospital. The only relative he leaves is a niece, Mrs. H. Fielding Rankine. Mr. Lawton was buried and accompanied by his father for a time until he took up music as a profession. He remained with Sousa until 1912, when, at the conclusion of an Oriental tour, he retired and settled at Los Angeles, California. Last June he came back to his home city to accept an engagement at the Imperial. Although a great artist, Mr. Lawton was one of the most unassuming of men. His death will be regretted by friends everywhere.—Globe, Feb. 24.

MR. WINFIELD McWHIA

Mr. Winfield McWhia, aged 33 years, son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew McWhia, died on Tuesday, Feb. 23, at St. Stephen. He leaves, his wife, parents, three brothers, Harry in Nashua, N. H.; Aubrey, in Massachusetts, and Walter of St. Stephen, and one sister, Mrs. Harry Moran of Bradford, Penn.

MR. JOHN SHAUGHNESSY

Mr. John Shaughnessy, aged 37 years, son of Mr. John Shaughnessy, H. M. Customs, St. Stephen, died on Saturday, Feb. 20, after a few months' illness. He leaves, besides his father, four brothers and two sisters: Harold, Montreal; Joseph, Fredericton; Arthur, Los Angeles, Cal.; and William, of St. Stephen; Mrs. John M. Elmore, St. John, and Alice, at home. The interment took place on Monday.

DR. J. D. PHINNEY

Dr. J. D. Phinney, K. C., LL. D., passed away in Fredericton, on Sunday morning last, in the seventy-first year of his age. The funeral took place Tuesday afternoon, from his late residence, University avenue. Interment was made at the Rural cemetery. The deceased is survived by one son, Dr. F. D. Phinney, of Cincinnati, and one daughter, Annie, wife of Robert W. McLellan, of Fredericton. One brother, Havelock Phinney, of Winnipeg, survives, also three sisters, Mrs. J. D. McMin, Miss Bessie Phinney, of Richibucto, and Mrs. Fred Brown, of Aspen, California. In politics the late Dr. Phinney was a Liberal, and occupied a prominent position in that party in the county of York. In religion he was a Methodist.

Mr. Justice J. G. Forbes, of St. John, N. B., who has announced his retirement from the Bench, was born at Guysborough, N. S., in 1838. He was educated at Antigonish Academy, at Halifax, and at Harvard University. He was called to the Bar in 1865, and settled at St. John, where he soon became recognized as an authority on legal matters. Judge Forbes took an active interest in politics, contesting St. John for the Local House in the Conservative interests at the general elections of 1872, and later was nominated for Guysborough for the Federal House. He has been a prominent figure in the Presbyterian Church. Judge Forbes was appointed to the bench in 1895.—Journal of Commerce.
