MRS. BEEMER STANDS ON TRIAL
---SYMPATHY FOR THE ACCUSED

Grand Jury is Calling a Score of Witnesses—Townspople Gave Liberally to Defence Find—New and Startling Testimony.

WOODSTOCK, Nov. 3.—Seldom if ever, has this place been thrown into such intense excitement as is displayed in connection with the charge of murder pending against Mrs. Grace Beemer of Drumbo, who is alleged to have poisoned her husband and is under indictment for trial at the Fall Assizes, which opened here yesterday with Mr. Justice Kelly presiding.

It was expected that the Grand Jury would have brought in a bill yesterday, but the Grand Jurors made it known that they would examine a score or more of witnesses before rendering their decision. It is not expected now that the finding will be presented before noon to-morrow.

The sympathy of the townspeople for Mrs. Beemer is very strong. In fact they backed up their position by subscribing liberally to a fund to be used in defraying the expense of the defence of Mrs. Beemer.

Question to be Determined

The question which confronts the Crown officers is to determine whether the poison was administered to Beemer by Mrs. Beemer. Recognizing the importance of the question Mr. Justice Kelly in his address to the Grand Jury strongly emphasized the conditions upon which they should decide whether or not Mrs. Beemer should face trial. The defence, it is understood, will produce witnesses to show that Mrs. Beemer had never harbored a spirit of animosity towards her husband or any other member of the household. There are, of course, other details to be filled in, according to the Crown officials, who say they are in possession of certain facts leading up to the occasion, and from the time Beemer drank the contents of a cup of tea in which Mrs. Beemer is alleged to have dropped strychnine and another ingredient supposedly a powder.

Mason Repeats His Testimony

John Mason, a farmhand employed on a neighboring farm, who is the chief witness for the Crown, was among the first batch of witnesses called before the Grand Jury. Mr. Mason, who declared at the preliminary trial that he saw Mrs. Beemer empty the contents of a bottle bearing a label "strychnine" into a cup of tea which she handed her husband, again repeated his evidence and added a few points which he omitted to disclose at the police court proceedings.

Chief Parker to be Called

With the appearance in the witness box of Mason, an interesting cross-examination is predicted by the defence counsel. The latter will endeavor to question the veracity of Mason's utterances by a witness in the person of Chief of Police Parker of Yarmouth, England, who reached town yesterday. According to the defence counsel, the father of young Mason is a subordinate police officer attached to the Yarmouth police force, of which Chief Parker is the head.

Whether or not Chief Parker will be permitted to give his evidence is a point upon which it is said the prosecuting attorney will take objection. Chief Parker is not greatly enamored with Canada, and he says he will abandon his shores as soon as he is at liberty to sail.

In the prosecuting of Mrs. Beemer the Crown officials state they will not confound strangeness with mystery, but they will show that while the most commonplace crime is often the most mysterious, this case presents special features from which deductions may be drawn. In this connection they will endeavor to show that the case is surrounded by substantial accompaniments which have rendered it remarkable.

According to the jail officials Mrs. Beemer has greatly improved in health since her appearance at the police court investigation. They say the mists in her own mind relative to the main facts upon which the Crown will prosecute her are gradually clearing away, and she feels that she will be pronounced innocent. During her incarceration another child was born. This tragic feature, it is said, was responsible for the sympathy exhibited by the townspeople, who came to her aid with funds that would be helpful in her time of trouble.

ULSTER BUSINESS MEN AGAINST HOME RULE

\$600,000,000 Worth of Them Attended a Meeting in Belfast.

BELFAST, Nov. 5.—Combined wealth, estimated at \$600,000,000, was represented yesterday at a gigantic business men's anti-home rule mass meeting in historic Ulster Hall, attended by 6,000. George Ewart, President of the Chamber of Commerce, occupied the rostrum. He said that the meeting was called to disprove the statements made in England that the commercial interests of Ulster were not in sympathy with the movement against home rule.

The meeting unanimously and enthusiastically adopted a resolution declaring that Ulster business men will not consent to pay taxes to a Dublin Parliament and approving of the suggestion of the Ulster volunteers under the "provisional Government," and other warlike measures adopted by the Ulsterists.

Sir Edward Carson, leader of the Ulster Unionists, attended the meeting and warmly congratulated the business men on their willingness to make every sacrifice for interests bigger than their pocket-books.

KIND-HEARTED EXECUTIONER

Death of Berry, Who Hanged Over Two Hundred People.

By the death of Bradford (announced on Thursday) of James Berry, ex-husband, a curious personality is removed. Berry was originally a policeman and a boot salesman, but through kind hearted man and a devoted husband and father, the post of executioner had a grim fascination for him.

He deliberately set himself to qualify for the position, and when it became vacant he was one of over 1,000 applicants who wished to succeed Marwood. Two poachers, who had murdered two gamekeepers on Lord Roseberry's estate at Dalmeny, were awaiting execution, and Harry sent the following letter to the Edinburgh magistrates:

"I was very intimate with the late Mr. Marwood, and he made me thoroughly acquainted with his system of carrying out his work, and also the information which he learnt from the doctors of different prisons which he had to visit to carry out the last sentence of the law.

"I have now one rope of his which I bought from him at Horncastle, and have had two made from it. I have also two pinning straps made from his, also two leg straps.

"I have seen Mr. Calcraft execute three convicts at Manchester thirteen years ago, and should you think fit to give me the appointment I would endeavor to merit your approval.

"One of the most startling events in his career was his failure to execute John Lee, the Babington murderer, whose sentence was afterwards commuted to penal servitude. Three attempts were made, but the trap refused to fall, although when no one was standing on it it worked easily enough.

At Carlisle, while engaged to hang Rudge Martin, and Baker, the notorious Netherby Hall burglars, Berry created a sensation by bringing into the jail as his assistant a well-known English baronet. Among the criminals with whom he dealt was James Bury, a London cats-meat dealer, whose wife's body was discovered in a box ready for despatch to the Colonies.

Berry always maintained that the man was the author of the White-chapel crimes, and gave as evidence that two Scotland Yard detectives present at the execution assured him that there would not be any more outrages in the East End after Bury's death.

At one time he used to sell relics of executions, a rope fetching as much as £20 from private collectors. Protesters were made against this, and eventually the practice was stopped by the Government.

On his retirement Berry undertook a lecturing tour, and was afterwards a lay preacher, but subsequently settled down on a poultry farm in Bradford, his native town.
