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SEVERAL FINES WERE INFLICTED IN POLICE COURT

Liquor Cases Were Disposed of—A Greek Wage Dispute.

The coffers of the Brantford police court were enriched as the result of today's proceedings, when several fines of amounts varying from the costs to \$25 were inflicted. There was a long list of out-of-workers who were asked to account for their unemployment. In many cases they said they had jobs to go to, while others said they were temporarily laid off. One excuse was that the police always came across the defendant when he was not working, and never saw him when he was. He claimed he had to leave work to attend the proceedings. The Chief says he is determined upon a clean-up previous to the Old Home Week celebrations, as he will not have any idlers around that week. He firmly believes that Satan finds mischief for idle hands to do, and is acting in accordance. c

Wages Were Garnished.

Nick Poulos has had some trouble with the payment of two of his staff, and they brought him up for non-payment of wages to-day. They were transferred from Louis Carlos. It happened that Londy did not like the idea of having to eat what was left over from dinner, and had kicked, with the result that he was given a ticket-of-leave, but did not get his wages from the first of the month. For this he asked. The defendant had a different tale to tell, and said plaintiff owed one of his fellow-men \$100 and intended leaving the town in order to escape payment of the debt. The story he had told was a fabrication. Defendant denied that he was going to leave the city, and said his watch and ring were held by the police for the payment of adjusted matters and gave Londy his ring and watch, saying that was not a matter for the police. The ring was handed over to the creditor by complainant. Other debts were mentioned against Londy, and the magistrate made an order for full payment of wages claimed, the money to be paid into court, when the just debts will be met and the balance handed over to Londy. c

Louis Carlos asked for payment of wages due to him, and the magistrate issued an order for the payment of that which was legally due to him. The Nelson St. Scrap The four foreigners who had a lively period upon Nelson street, at the corner of Clarence, were each fined \$3 and ordered to pay costs by the Bench to-day. After hearing evidence Magistrate Livingston decided that the Armenians and Maltese were equally guilty of the breach of the peace. They had used sticks, stones, and saved, and according to witnesses' injuries had not been caused to those around at the time. c

Frank Atfield was found guilty upon a charge of supplying a billed man and he was summarily dealt with. P. C. Cox saw him with the billed man, and noticed them throw a bottle away which had been purchased by defendant. This was conclusive, and a fine of \$25 imposed. c

Austin Bumberry was inclined to make a cheap breast of things this morning, and he told the Bench when he was charged with being an Indian under the influence that he was asked in a Market street restaurant if he wanted some cold tea. He replied yes and was brought some stuff which tasted like whiskey. He now knew what cold tea was. He was fined \$5, and also fined another fiver for being disorderly. c

Costly Fire Water Nelles Peters, an Indian, was found with fire water upon him two weeks ago by County Constable Lottridge, and he got away to be hauled up this morning. The case was proved against him and he will have to pay \$25 and costs for his liberty. c

Work at Lorne Bridge. A start on throwing the concrete into the excavation, where it will act as a support for the jacks and also to serve as a temporary abutment to the bridge while it is being raised, was made to-day at Lorne Bridge. The sides of the bridge at the east end are already supported on jacks and as soon as the concrete sets, the others will be brought into play. c

Oiling of Streets a Success. Very satisfactory tests have been made of the application of oil on city streets in place of water to settle the dust. No matter how sandy or dusty the road may be the oil has proved successful in settling the dust. Ald. G. A. Ward, Chairman of the Board of Works, when seen this morning, said that the city is not in shape just now to continue the application of the oil instead of water, as it would be necessary to arrange a by-law to that effect. However, the residents on streets where it has been tried out, are so pleased with it that if the residents on any street wish to have the oil it can be supplied to them at a frontage cost of only two cents per foot, that is one cent per foot on each side of an eighteen foot roadway. One application of the oil will settle the dust and keep it down for a month or more, while two applications will last throughout the summer. c
