Old-Time Pitcher Could Twirl With Both Arms

Toronto World: Followers of baseball have often heard of the fellow who could pitch a fast ball with either hand and make it curve also, but very few have seen one of these pitching freaks. Baseball history tells of a chap named Owen Keenan, who pitched for Youngstown, Ohio, in 1885. Keenan could pitch equally well with either arm. On July 3 of that season this wonder pitched two games of ball against New Castle and beat that team in both contests. He worked his left arm in the first game and used his right wing in the second contest, with odds slightly in favor of the right whip.

The famous Larry Corcoran of the Chicago team in the early '80s was one of the great hurlers of the period. Larry lost the use of his wonderful right arm during the season of 1886. This almost broke his heart, for Larry was not old in years. It dawned upon him that he might make a left handed pitcher, for he was always clever at throwing with his left and used to practice frequently. In the season of 1886 Corcoran signed with a Southern League team as a left-handed pitcher and reported for

practice as such. He worked hard to gain control, for he developed rare speed. Larry pitched a few exhibition games and in one of them kindled his remaining wing so badly that he was released, so he had to quit the game for he had run out of pitching arms.

New York, July 5.—Ty Cobb is so far ahead of the other players in the country in the matter of stolen bases that you can't see him for dust. Ty in his first fifty-six games, purloined 38 sacks. Fritz Maisel, of the Yanks, his most dangerous rival, has stolen 25 bases, just thirteen behind the fleet Tiger.
