Music and Drama The Colonial The feature of a splendid programme at the Colonial for the first part of the week is Mme. Betts' admirers believe he will prove a tough morsel for the clever invader. This pair will go six rounds.

Scott and Alter are working out together. Both are in ideal condition. Conway is putting in his final licks at his home, and will arrive here on Thursday. His manager writes that he is quite confident of trimming the Indian, and that the local crowd is in for a fine night's entertainment if Scott shows a willingness to make matters interesting. That Scott is also confident is evident by the remarks of his manager, Frank Fell, who says that he will surely win. It looks as if Hamiltonians will be out en masse to witness the bouts. Reservations have been asked for over a hundred from the city 26 miles east of here, and the Hamilton boxers will be well supported when they enter the ring, Brantford is also expected to arise to the occasion. It is the most pleasing bill local enthusiasts have been provided with for many a day, and if the opera house is not jammed to capacity it will be surprising.
