Geo. W. Cook who murdered his wife in Halifax last July and tried last Friday and Saturday before Judge Graham, was on Monday convicted of the murder.

Judge Graham then imposed the sentence of death. He said: "George William Cook, you have been indicted and tried on the charge of murdering your wife, Lydia Cook, and have been found guilty by twelve of your peers. The sentence of the court is that you be taken back to jail and that on January 15th, 1903, between the hours of 8 and 10 o'clock, a. m. at the place and manner prescribed by law, you be hanged by the neck until you are dead, and the Lord have mercy on your soul."

Last Sunday King Edward VII, accompanied by Queen Alexandra, the Prince of Wales, and almost all the Royal Family drove to St. Paul's Cathedral and offered up thanks for the recovery of his health.
