their paving plant during the time they were not running in Chatham. Referred to Finance.
Mr. Farrell asked permission to rent a stall in the market and also to sell medicine on the square. Referred to the Property Committee.
Chairman Austin, of the Industrial Committee, reported as follows:
That the account of the Water Works Department against the Defiance Iron Works, as amended, for \$38.39, be paid by the city in conformity with the agreement with the Defiance Iron Works.
The report was adopted.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE.
Chairman Westman, for the Property Committee, reported as follows:
1. Re the resignation of Mr. Side as electric lineman, we recommend the same be accepted.
2. Re the appointment of the electric lineman to fill vacancy, we recommend that Mr. Walter Moore be appointed at same salary, duties to commence at once.
3. Re the purchasing of fire extinguishers, we recommend that the city order a half-dozen complete extinguishers for the use of the fire department.
The report was adopted.

INQUIRIES.
Under the head of inquiries, Ald. Edmondson asked when the Board of Works are going to have the wind-breaks placed on the bridges.
It will be done right away.
Ald. Austin—When will the new caretaker assume his duties at the market square?
Ald. Westman—He will be on in a few days.
Ald. Austin—Is it the intention of the Property Committee to have the rules placed up in the market building?
Ald. Westman—Yes, as soon as we get in running order.
The Mayor—Why is all that tile piled up on Pine St., when the sewer will not be put down this year?
Ald. Ainsworth—It is the intention of the Board of Works to put the sewer down this year if possible.

The Mayor—Re the sprinkling of the streets, has any provision been made for days like last Saturday? Business people were complaining about the dust.
The Board of Works replied that it was the intention to have all the streets cleaned this week.
The Mayor—Why was the basement of the market building filled with dust on Saturday. It was very unsanitary.
Ald. Westman—The basement was swept on Thursday. On Friday some varnishing was done and the place could not be swept out again as the dust would injure the varnish.
The Mayor—I understand about four or five barrels of filth was taken out of the menhole on Richmond street. Are the other sewers in town in the same shape?
Ald. O'Keefe—That was an exceptional case.
Ald. Potter—Do I understand the Board of Works will look after the sewers?
The Mayor—They are doing so now, I understand.
Ald. Potter—Shouldn't they look after the other sewers also?
The Mayor—The Engineer and the Board of Works should do so.
Ald. O'Keefe—That is a sanitary matter and should be reported by the Sanitary Inspector.
The Mayor—Complaints reach the Sanitary Inspector when some one dies. The Board of Works should look after it.
Ald. O'Keefe—We will have all the sewers examined.

WATER MAIN EXTENSION.
The Mayor—What is the Finance Committee going to do with the water main extension scheme?
Ald. Austin—That was discussed at the last meeting of the committee. I think it is the intention to report that it is not advisable to make any recommendation to the Council at the present time, as all the streets in the city have not got good sewers.

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Ald. Austin gave notice of a motion to close up street leading from Thames St. to the river, between the Police Station and O. B. Hallin's property. This was done so that the property may be sold and the funds turned over to the city.
