A GIANT INDUSTRY.

Immense Ship Building Plants to Be Erected at Sault Ste. Marie.

Sir Christopher Furness' \$10,000,000 Contract With Clergue Syndicate.

ST. LAWRENCE NAVIGATION NO DRAWBACK.

New York, Dec. 5.—Sir Christopher Furness, M. P., sailed for England yesterday. He has made arrangements with the Clergue interests at Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., for the erection of an immense shipbuilding plant, to be located at Sault Ste. Marie, close to the junction of the "Soo" Canal and Lake Superior. Here will be erected steel works, which will cost approximately \$10,000,000, and the iron and coal fields of Canada will furnish the raw material.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Likely to be Opened on the 6th of February.

OTTAWA, Dec. 5.—Rumor was current last evening that Parliament would be called for business on January 23rd. This is denied in official quarters, and every effort is being made to have work in readiness for Parliament to be summoned for February 6th, but there are some doubts as to whether even that date may not be too early.

STRATHCONA'S HEALTH.

The High Commissioner Suffering From Influenza, With Complications.

MONTREAL, Dec. 5.—E. S. Clouston, General Manager of the Bank of Montreal, this morning received the following cable from the High Commissioner's office, London:

"The doctors authorize the following statement this morning: Lord Strathcona has had an attack of influenza, followed by sub-acute inflammation of one ear. Progress is slow but satisfactory. The condition has nothing whatever to do with the fall Lord Strathcona sustained in Montreal and from which he has entirely recovered."

LIQUOR IN CANDY.

A Montreal Woman in Trouble for Selling Alcohol in Sweets.

MONTREAL, Dec. 5.—Miss A. Miller, keeper of a candy store on Darnes Hill, has been summoned to the police court to answer a charge of selling liquor without license. Miss Miller kept a stock of chocolates, the interior of which were filled with brandy and other liquors, which she sold to boys and girls. A charge of selling liquor to minors was also laid against her. The chocolates are said to have been manufactured in Toronto.

ANTICOSTI IN DREAD.

Diphtheria Breaks Out and No Physician Can Get to the Island.

QUEBEC, Dec. 5.—An urgent message has been received from Governor Comstant of the Island of Anticosti, stating that an epidemic of diphtheria has broken out among the workmen of the Island, and asking that the steamer Savoy be put out of the harbor and sent down to the Island with a physician. Up to the present it has been found impossible to get the Savoy out of the ice, and it is feared she is frozen in for the winter.

CHARGE OF FORGERY.

A Well Connected French Canadian in Trouble at Montreal.

MONTREAL, Dec. 5.—Gregory Beau champ, aged 40, a well connected French Canadian, has been arrested charged with forgery. It is alleged that he visited various stores and in payment of small purchases offered cheques signed A. D. Morgan, who he claimed was his uncle. Beau champ secured some three hundred dollars in this way.

ROYALTY ENTERTAINED.

The City of London Honors the Prince and Princess of Wales.

Notable Assemblage Present at Ceremony.

Grand Reception During the Drive Through London's Streets.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The city entertained the Prince and Princess of Wales this afternoon at luncheon given in the Guild Hall, and presented them with an address of congratulation on the successful tour of the British Empire. The Royal party drove from York House to the Guildhall in an open landau, escorted by Life Guards. They met everywhere with the warmest reception from the sightseers lining the brightly bedecked and troop guarded route. The scene in the library of the corporation, where their Royal Highnesses were received by the Lord Mayor, Sir Joseph Demdale, and the corporation, was picturesque. Levee or diplomatic dress uniforms or judicial robes were worn by the majority of the guests, among whom were the Agents General of the Colonies. Prominent among the other notables present were Lord Salisbury, Lord Rosebery, and Mr. Chamberlain.

DAWSON A CITY.

Bill for its Incorporation Will be Passed by Yukon Council.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 5.—Advices from the north received by steamer City of Seattle state that a bill for the incorporation of Dawson will be passed at the next session of the Yukon Council, and that E. P. McMillan, of McMillan & McFeeley, hardware merchants, will doubtless be elected as Dawson's first mayor.

OUT OF PRISON.

William Weir, of Ville Marie Bank Fame, Released From Prison.

MONTREAL, Dec. 5.—William Weir, who was President of the defunct Bank Ville Marie, was released from the Montreal jail this morning, after having served a sentence of nearly two years for sending a false bank report to the Dominion Government. He was met at the gate by his son and driven at once to his home. He is said to be enjoying better health than when he was incarcerated, excepting that he suffers from loss of memory.
