HAS PROCLAIMED A REPUBLIC. Aguinaldo Sets Up a Government in the Philippines.

London, July I.—A representative of Gen. Againaldo, the leader of the Philippine insurgents, who served with him during the last insurrection, and who is now in London, is quoted in an interview as saying that before Againaldo left Hong Kong he promised Rear Admiral Diewey not to enter Manila until the arrival of the American troops. Againaldo's representative adds that he has just received a despatch from Cavite saying a republic has been proclaimed there by Againald, under protection of the United States and approved by Great Britain and Japan. Continuing, the representative of the Philippine leader asserts that he has been to Berlin, where he saw the Under Secretary fon the Foreign Office, who declared that all Germany wanted was that the existing import tariff should not be altered by a republic being established in the Philippine Islands, or, at least, that preference should not be given to any other nation. given to any other nation.

It would not surprise officials here if riots began in Santiago over a fallure of the Spanish forces to surrender or capitulate within a reasonable time. The Administration believes that Sinfter will capture early all the enemy's forces now in Santiago. 
